AFTERNOON SESSION OF INSTITUTE IS ENJOYABLE

SUPERINTENDENT ALDERMAN OF PORTLAND DELIVERS ADDRESS.

Yesterday afternoon's session of the teachers' institute was opened at 1:30. Fifteen minutes were spent in singing under the leadership of Charles W. Jones, the musical director of the institute.

The first number of the afternoon session was a vocal solo by Mrs. J. R. Dickson, entitled "Invictus." So pleasing was this first number that Mrs. Dickson was encored, and favored the audience with a second song.

After Mrs. Dickson's songs, the teachers separated into the respective classrooms for the section work, which lasted from 1:45 until 2:30 P. M. L. E. Alderman of the Portland city schools remained in the auditorium and spoke on "Making People Do Things." He emphasized the great importance in the development of music, art, domestic science, and especially the development of character reading for teachers.

Mrs. R. H. Hobbie spoke on "Games for School Room and Yard" in one of the rooms. Mr. Griffin of the Oregon agricultural college, emphasized the new courses in "Elementary Agriculture," and Dr. Heskney dwelt upon the "Relations of Latin to Practical Life."

At the end of the section work, all returned to the main auditorium and were favored by a vocal solo, "The Creole Lover's Song," by P. R. Atkins, which so delighted those present that he was forced to reappear and favor them with a second selection.

Following Mr. Atkins' solo, Mrs. Hofer gave an address on "The Reorganized Play Ground." She developed the value of organized play in the school room; and emphasized the splendid method of practical training in the educational departments of the schools in the state of Oregon.

L. R. Alderman then gave a splendid address on "Motives for Productive Work" in which he made prominent the significance of planning before hand a vocation for this life's work, and showed the fallacy of unpreparable work. "We must have a motive in reading, in teaching, in learning, and in every thing we do," he declared. He also impressed the teachers with the necessity of discovering what their pupils desire to be, and in helping them to choose a vocation.

Clubs Prohibit Alms.
LONDON, Oct. 29.—The governing committee of the City Carlton Club has issued a circular to its members intimating that it would be an act of delicacy and avoid the possibility of situations of embarrassment, if those members who are of German or Austro-Hungarian origin, whether naturalized or not, should not frequent the club. Members are at the same time requested to "refrain from offering hospitality in the club to persons of such origin." Similar action is being taken by other well-known clubs. WHEN "PIGS IS PIGS" UP TO COMMERCE BODY

WASHINGTON, Oct. 29.—"Pigs is Pigs," the comic tale recently popular, was vividly before the interstate commerce commission and representatives of express companies when the commission today opened hearings on new rules proposed, regulating packing and shipping of a widely miscellaneous list of merchandise.

How to ship guinea pigs was one of the questions before the commission. Hasty transport of the animals is an imperative rule of the express companies.

Other questions involved in the hearings were:

- Maximum weight limit for shipments of mice; standardizing of value of opossums; how to pack duck eggs; protection of live crabs in shipment and treatment of shrimps (edible variety).

Regulations for shipping moving picture films were also before the commission.

Home Hints and Recipes

Household Hints.
It is recommended that a little vinegar be added to the water in which stockings are rinsed after being washed. The stockings should then be dried wrong side out. Colored stockings will be unfaded, and black ones will retain their original lustre.

Wash new glasses for the first time in cold water; this will give them a brighter look than if hot water is used. Glasses that have been used for milk should also first be washed in cold water, or they are apt to look cloudy when dried.

For green and white decorations, cheese balls may be rolled in chopped parsley and be dotted around marriage of asparagus tips. With red flowers, bar-le-duc may be mixed with the cheese.

A fresh mildew spot can be removed with lemon juice and exposure to the sun. If it is an old spot, dissolve a tablespoonful of chloride of lime in four quarts of cold water and soak the fabric.

Italy Has Eye on Albania.
PARIS, Oct. 29.—The action of Greece in occupying the southern end of Albania is regarded by competent observers here to be a move of great moment which may cause Italy also to occupy a part of Albania.

Italians already have been landed in Albania, a naval force, having occupied the seaport of Avlona on October 26. The expedition, according to a dispatch from Rome, was in the nature of a relief and sanitary organization. It was added that pains were being taken to show that Italy's step was merely for the purpose of seeing that the decision of the London conference creating an autonomous Albania was carried out.

Hongkong Bars Enemies.
HONGKONG, Oct. 29.—The legislative council of Hongkong passed an ordinance to go into effect immediately, compelling all enemies of Great Britain residing within the colony to bring their business enterprises to an end and depart. The government will appoint liquidators. Any persons purchasing such a foreign business must show their good faith.

There are as many German firms doing business in Hongkong as there are English.
