UNRELENTING WAR TO BE WAGED AGAINST PREDATORY ANIMALS

ESTIMATED THAT OVER \$15,000,000 WORTH OF STOCK KILLED BY BEASTS.

Wolves, Coyotes, Wildcats, Cougars and Bears Play Havoc Among Livestock in Many Sections of the Country—Large Sum of Money Appropriated to Carry on Work.

According to the announcement of the district forester at Portland, Ore., the recently passed agricultural appropriation bill contained a provision by which \$100,000 is to be set aside toward the destruction of predatory animals.

It is estimated that over \$15,000,000 worth of stock is destroyed annually in the United States through the depredations of such animals as wolves, coyotes, wildcats, cougars and bears.

While the biological survey will have charge of the work, the forest service will cooperate with them in the regions of the west where there are national forests. The service has already had some experience in hunting wild animals. The invasion of the national forest range in years past by wolves, coyotes and cougars has been very marked, and it has at times been found necessary to employ trained hunters to trap and kill these invaders.

The rangers, too, have done excellent work in trapping and poisoning these preying animals. But the service has been handicapped for lack of funds to spend in hiring men for this purpose and furnishing them with the necessary arms and ammunition. Hence the work done has been but a temporary relief.

Now, however, that an appropriation has been made, the work can be carried on with some hope of success and stock owners both inside and outside of the national forests may look forward to the time when their sheep and cattle will be free from the attacks of these rapacious marauders.

As a result of this activity on the part of the federal government, the stock owners themselves have awakened to the needs of the situation. At a recent meeting of the Oregon Wool Growers' association, a resolution was passed and a petition mailed to Washington, urging congress to make an appropriation of \$500,000 for the extermination of predatory animals in the United States.

With the Stars Along the Great White Way

NEW YORK, Jan. 9.—Speed seems to be the newest ingredient in all musical comedy of today. There was a time when a show could make good with tuneful music or with clever lines. And many a hit managed to get across by having pretty and shapely girls in the chorus and even when some of them did not need to be pretty. But this season it is different. In addition to all the foregoing, mind you, there must be speed. The acts must move with celerity, the principals must grab their cues on the wing or from the wings, if you like, and the whole performance must end at 11 o'clock. A show that lasts longer than that each night will not last longer than a fortnight on Broadway.

The latest of the musical comedies is "Hello Broadway," characterized as a "musical crazy quilt, patched and threaded together with words and music by Mr. George M. Cohen. Like "Chin Chin," "Dancing Around," and "Watch Your Step," the action is never halted for an instant from beginning to end. Cohen, despite the predictions of the critics that he would never again appear on the stage in a musical comedy, is the same old George Yankee Doodle days. Playing opposite him is another old favorite, Willie Collier. The team is an excellent one. Collier summed it up pretty well when he said, "With your nerve and my ability we ought to get this thing over."

For those who like to know about those things as a matter of historical record, "Hello Broadway" is a revelation intended to burlesque the leading Broadway "hits." The piece gets its name from a duet sung by Cohen and Collier. Outside of these two facts, not much more can be said. A thousand bright lights, a medley of synopscaped music with such alluring titles as "The Carriage Starters' Glide," "Broadway Tipperary," "Hippodrome Folks" and "Down on the Eric," countless wonderfully handsome girls and the hundreds of quips and cranks from the clever C's cannot be set down in mere black and white.

Louise Dresser, Rosalia Dolly, Tom Dingle, Lawrence Wheat, and Belle Bianche helped out in the general effect but the two big stars, Cohen and Collier, make the show go—with speed.

Post mortems over the failure of the Century Opera company are now in order. The closing of the company in Chicago last Saturday occasioned no great amount of surprise although many felt regretful to think that music of a high standard of excellence should be such a decided frost in this country—both in New York and in Chicago.
