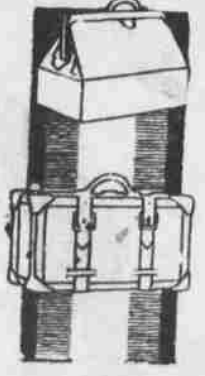

"HEALTH OF NAVY IS EXCELLENT"

Surgeon General Braisted So Reports for All Stations, at Home and Abroad.

WASHINGTON, July 7.—Surgeon General Braisted's report for last week reads:

"Reports and returns from all naval stations, including the fleets and various ships, both at home and abroad, indicated so unusual health conditions and in general show that the health of the navy is excellent.

"The epidemic of diseases of various types that existed during the past few months have almost disappeared, most of the cases in hospitals being convalescents awaiting final disposition with here and there a few cases of this type marking the disappearing incidents of local infectious areas."
