The I fe of the camp, where the beneficial influence of mother, wife and sister, and of home discip inc are infelt, is most pernistous to morals, and as all armies are usually com? pised of the youth of the land, he fountain is poisoned at the very head. The old officers of the revolution were accustomed to deplore the effects of military life upon their subordinates, the vices of gaming, blasphemy and general debauchery, having as they saw, indee rapid strides amonst men who, when eng ged in the peaceful pursuits of husband-ry, commerce or mechanical employments had been useful and exemplary citizens. It is not our purpose here to intimate that the man of the camp is necessarily likely to prove the worst member of society; on the contrary, wh re he has been subjected to proper discipline, he m y be improved, but it is the general effect of war in exciting bad emotions to which we refer. Those who re-main at home are placed under the influence of the same feelings, and become more or less affected. From all sides we hear of the commission of enormous crimes, of increasing lawles ness, of contempt for the restraints of law, with the disgusting and sickening details of which our exchanges from every quarter are laden. Society must, and of course will right itself in this matter, but the steps to be taken by our civil guardians cannot be too s on adopted. An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure, and it is rather uscless to lock the stable door after the horse has been stolen. The obvious du-ties of the custodians of the public safety is to exercise reneved vigilance, to throw additional guards around the p operty and pe son of the citizens and by an example of high public morality and fidelity to duty, to re-assure the good and defer the efforts of the vicious .- Baltimore Sun.

The Internal revenue system we have, faulty as it is in contrivance, and imperfect in its working through our inexperience of such a machine, would of itself suffice to raise more than the interest of the debt, and to throw a surplus into the General Treasury if it hadsurplus into the General Treasury if it had the efficiency of the English, French and German machineries for ax collection. The public will be astonished and not content to public will be astonished and not content to learn that of the one hundred million gallans of whisky annually distilled in the United States, but forty millions pay the excise duty—that sixty million gallons slip through our collection, or dide—do somehow et drank untaxed, or re-manufactured in defiance of law—that one hundred and twenty milli ns of dollars from this one source, and most righteous source of revesource, and most righteous source, of revenue, are yearly lost to the National Treasury for want of collection—a sum of money practically attainable, that is within fo tyfive millions of the whole am unt of the year's interest on the entire National Debt! Save this needless waste. Gather the whole of the income which our tax law is framed to yield. Cease to lose three-quarters, or any part of it. The power of the Nation any port of it. The cover of the Nation vigit atly and faithfully applied, with the aid of adequate peralties for the infraction of the laws to be enforced without fear, faof the laws to be enforced without tear, la-vor, or affection, is surel, equal to the col-lection of every dollar of revenue from a system at once simple and p pular by its limitation to a few leading articles of pro-duction. Revise the Excise System itself.
