

CIRCUIT COURT PROCEEDINGS.

The following cases were disposed of on Monday and Tuesday: Stringer vs. Heller, dismissed. Alcnas vs. Heppner, dismissed. Smith vs. Graham—decision of Court below reversed, and case remanded for further proceedings. State vs. Francis Jones—forgery—trial by jury, verdict guilty; sentence today. State vs. John Eppinger—State not being ready for trial, the case was dismissed by the court. State vs. Henry Trickle—larceny—defendant plead guilty; sentence today. Wiley & Kenay vs. Moffin & Moffin—decision of court below reversed and cause remanded back for further proceedings. F. Mignet vs. F. W. Blanchett, settled and dismissed.

TIMELY WARNING.—The Mining and Scientific Press gives its readers some timely warning, adapted to the locality, (San Francisco) in which it is published. It is suggested that, when the next earthquake comes, the people will find it safest not to rush into the streets too suddenly, as there is more danger between two rows of lofty brick buildings than inside houses of a similar character. Persons should aim to get close to partitions or outside walls, and cling to them until the heaviest shocks are over. In stage-coach traveling, passengers are recommended to stick to the vehicle to the last extremity. This advice is not always safe, however, as witness the case when "Wardsey" tumbled a coach over the cliff between the Dalles and Deschutes. If there had been passengers in it, and they had followed the advice of our scientific cotemporary, the consequences would have been terrible, as it was six hundred feet to the bottom.

SPURS OF NATIONAL PRIDE.—Old Froissart tells us that when, on the 11th of July, 1302, the weavers, butchers and others of Bruges and Ghent, with their allies, defeated Count Robert of Artois, and inflicted a loss of nearly 30,000 men, among whom were 700 knights, 700 gilt spurs were hung from the roof of the church Notre Dame, at Courtray. Long after, when the French in their turn defeated Van Artevelde at Mont d'Or, one of the first things they did was to take down the spurs and send them home; next, they burned Courtray in a thorough manner.

OPERATIC AND CHOLERAIC.—The Chronique Musicale, of Paris, has discovered a coincidence between the cholera and the production of a new opera by Meyerbeer. In 1832 the epidemic followed the first performance of Robert, in 1849, it came with the Prophete, and in 1854 with l'Etoile du Nord. And now, in 1865, we have l'Africain. Is the cholera really on its way?

It is said that Andrew Johnson, when he emigrated from North Carolina, fell in company with Andrew Jackson, then traveling west from Washington. They were attacked by robbers, and were victorious. The two were a strong team, and if the story is true, it is somewhat remarkable.

According to the telegraphic news of a few days since, Napoleon has written a letter to Maximilian, rebuking him for want of energy in conducting affairs in Mexico. If he has done anything of the kind, it is not very likely that it is made public.

PARTIES intending to visit the mines up the Columbia the coming season, are constructing batteaux below the Cascades, with the view to use them for the transportation of their supplies clear through to the Dalles de mort.

The S. F. Flag contains a very well-directed protest, against the undue value placed upon the representations of the traveling correspondents of the eastern press who have made hurried visits to this country.

A YOUNG man who has served three years in the armies at the east during the civil war with distinguished gallantry, has lately been convicted in San Francisco of stealing a pair of boots.

POSTAL MONEY ORDERS.—The following are the terms upon which the postal money orders may be procured:

The charges for drafts or orders payable at any distributing post office in the United States, are as follows: Sums under \$10, ten cents; over \$10 and under \$20, sixteen cents; over \$20 and not exceeding \$30, twenty cents. No orders for over \$30 will be issued. The orders are payable in U. S. Legal Tender or the bills of the National Banks, and are purchasable at par for like funds; in other words, you pay \$10, \$20, or \$30, and the registry fee, in greenbacks, and get an order for a corresponding amount in the same funds.
