

Stillman Resumes Divorce Fight In Secret Testimony

New York, May 4.—James A. Stillman who yesterday resigned the presidency of the National City bank, today resumed, in the first of a series of secret hearings, his fight for divorce from Mrs. Anne Urquhart Stillman.

It was said at the outset of the hearing today, which is being held before Referee Daniel J. Gleason in the rooms of the bar association, that the presentation of evidence would require at least three days.

Several French-Canadians from Three Rivers, Quebec, site of the Stillman summer camp, are here for the hearing.

In this connection it was said that Mr. Stillman would produce testimony to support his contention that his wife is the mother of a male child by their former Indian servant and guide, Fred Beauvais. In addition it was reported, further charges of alleged misconduct would be preferred against Mrs. Stillman.

It was announced that witnesses summoned by counsel for Mrs. Stillman in her counter charges of infidelity, will be called to testify at a later hearing.

Mrs. Stillman Appears. Shortly before the hearing, held behind closed doors, began a smartly dressed woman stepped into the room.

Newspapermen thought they recognized Mrs. Stillman and lawyers on both sides did not deny it was she. One, asked directly if it was Mrs. Stillman, replied: "I presume it was she."

Mr. Stillman was not present. An imposing array of legal talent, representing both sides, assembled for today's hearing. Present also were Francis Lajoie, a Canadian lawyer, who acted as translator for the French-Canadian witnesses, and William Lund, special deputy attorney general. The reason for Mr. Lund's presence was not explained.

It was learned that the first witnesses called were two French-Canadians who had not testified at the previous hearing last December.

Settlement of Marine Strike Still Distant

Washington, May 3.—With the ship owners declining arbitration, Chairman Benson of the Shipping Board firmly opposed to a compromise on his fifteen per cent wage reduction order, and representatives of the strikers confident that the "owners will come to terms" the controversy over seamen's wages and working conditions appeared today to be further from settlement than ever. No further word had come from the White House concerning a mediation commission and indications were that the president was waiting a reply from Secretaries Hoover and Davis, in whose hands the problem had been placed and who were expected to continue

Creamery Will Rebuild Plant Burned Sunday

Albany, Ore., May 4.—Despite the fact that the plant and equipment of the Albany Creamery association were destroyed by fire Sunday morning, cream producers are not to lose the market which the plant afforded. The association sent out notices to stockholders that the association will receive cream as usual and will soon have a larger plant with better equipment.

While it will take four or five months to get a new building and get the equipment ready for operation, the association will take the cream and send it to other creameries. The association will receive cream at the old Hazelwood place on Second street between Lyon and Ellsworth streets. This room was rented today.
