used the slender wooden bridge. built by Indians, when crossing the river. There he found 20
Indian families camped, fishing A cattleman, John Y. Todd in 1860 , built a bridge at Towornehiooks that was washed rebuilt his bridge and sold it to generation Irish/American cou-

Joe and Jane Sherar, hiring Indian laborers, graded a road

he Deschutes in 1861 and created a toll road and toll bridge. Sherar built a three-and-one-half-story building, used for their home.
