LOOK TO YOUR INTERESTS.

The following article is from the Oakland (Cal.) Daily News of the 9th ult, and is of as great importance to the people of Oregon as California:

England continues to be much agitated at the failure of the Albert Life Insurance Company, with \$7,000,000 liabilities and only \$1,000,000 assets, and at the probability that many other life insurance companies in that Kingdom are not much better off.

Four English life and fire insurance companies (or more properly associations) are doing a fire business on the Pacific coast. The authorized capitals of these concerns figure up \$40,000,000, of which, however, only \$3,450,000 has ever been subscribed, but how much of even this small capital has ever been paid in by these authorized millionaires, is not known to the public.

The failure of the authorized millionaire "Albert," with its \$7,000,000 liabilities, and only \$1,000,000 assets, will open the eyes of those who have been seduced by the "big companies on paper," and suggest to the Commissioner of California the importance of seeing the law enforced in the case of the English companies, as rigidly as in the case of the "Builders," while it may not be out of order for our Legislature to consider the propriety of compelling them to furnish the same guarantee to their California policy-holders that they are compelled to furnish the New Yorkers, an actual deposit of \$200,000, furnishing more solid security to our people than an authorized capital of ten millions, should we have any turning "belly up" in an effort to emulate PRINCE ALBERT.
