WHO INSULTS THE FLAG!

It will be remembered that, in order to disabuse the minds of many northern people concerning the alleged rebellious spirit of the people of the South, Sergeant Bates, a Wisconsin soldier, undertook to carry the flag unfurled from Vicksburg to Washington and travel the entire distance without a cent with which to defray expenses. He performed the feat, and wherever this brave soldier went among those who are denominated as rebels, the Stars and Stripes were hailed with loud acclaim by a populace which is this day devoted to the Constitution of the United States. From the dome of the Capitol at Richmond, where the Confederate Congress sat for years, the Old Flag was waved to the breeze, and the shouts of the very men who had battled with all their energies for a separate nationality attested that they are truly loyal. Distinguished ex-rebel chieftains everywhere took Sergeant Bates by the hand and exclaimed in his way. He was constantly entertained at the expense of Southern towns and cities, and was welcomed and made at home among the men who had fought against the flag he bore. Everywhere evidence of the most convincing character was given that the people of the South are ready to act the part of faithful and law-abiding citizens. It remained for the radicals who now hold possession of the Capitol at Washington, to insult the American flag by refusing to permit it to be displayed from the dome of the building which they daily desecrate by the display of feelings of animosity to the Union and the Constitution. Let the people mark the contrast. The ex-rebels are loyal today, and the principal leaders of the Republican party are traitors to the best interests of the nation.

Sergeant Bates arrived at Washington, Apr. 14, and was received by the President and everyone else not a traitor at heart and a coward by instinct, with tokens of very marked respect. Congressman Eldridge, of the state from which the Sergeant hailed, made the reception speech, when, after some remarks by Gen. Mangum, who fought at Vicksburg, a large concourse of patriotic people accompanied the Sergeant in the direction of the Capitol, on the dome of which he had agreed to plant the flag before leaving Wisconsin. Imagine the cheering, felt by all good people when the flag of our nationality floated on the dome of the people's Capitol.

THE Blasphemy of Monmouth precinct rather overdid the thing last Monday. They even had the audacity to refuse the votes of Messrs Mitchell and Rosend of, both old Oregonians, and business men in Independence, who only succeeded in preventing the mob that ruled the election board from disfranchising them by dint of unmitigated perseverance. Such a parody upon fair dealing is a burning disgrace to the age in which we live, and would be pronounced infamous and most unamatural and unmitigated by a jury composed of twelve Digger Indians.

A LIE ON ITS FACE.—The Record, in an effort to let its party down as easy as may be, since its Bull Run defeat in this state, and in the face of its oft repeated declaration during the late campaign, that a vote for Smith is a vote against Grant, assures its readers that the result on last Monday is no index to the Presidential result!
