These are a well-known native son and daughter of Coos county and have many friends throughout the valley with whom we join in extending congratulations.

Inquest at Beaver Hill.

Judge E. G. D. Holden, of this city, was called to Beaver Hill last Friday to hold an inquest over the remains of the late John Holachan, of that place, whose sudden death seemed to make such inquiry necessary. The county coroner was unable to attend.

Mr. Holachan was last seen alive on the evening of 11th inst., sitting on the steps near the company's store, at about 8 o'clock p. m., and did not go to work that night because he did not feel well. He was found dead at the bottom of the steps at about 5:30 on the morning of the 12th.

On the arrival of Justice Holden, the following jury was summoned: W. J. White, T. P. Wilson, A. M. Bantien, Wm. Nelson, C. Terris and Chas. Alexson, who, after being sworn, formally viewed the remains and adjournment was had until 1 o'clock in the afternoon.

The body was then taken to the hospital under the direction of the acting coroner, where Dr. E. Mings made post mortem examination.

When the session was resumed five witnesses were examined, the testimony of Dr. Mings settling the cause of death to be heart disease, and the bursting of a vein filling the heart sack with blood clots. Disease was of such standing that death was liable to occur at any moment.

Deceased had been complaining for a week or more of pains in his left breast and was off duty that night because he did not feel able to work. The verdict of the jury was in accordance with these facts: "That no crime had been committed, and that death was the result of natural causes."

Mr. Holachan had only been in America since last July, having left Scotland on the 3rd of that month and coming direct to Beaver Hill, in company with his brother-in-law, M. Comboy, where another brother-in-law was living. He was 38 years old and leaves a wife and two children, who expected to follow later, but who now, alas, in this world, will nevermore meet the husband, father and friend.
