

EXPERT JOHNSON.

He Discovered a Pure White Sunflower -Entirely Mew to Botanists.

Mr. A. J. Johnson, forestry expert, visited Corvallis and the Agricultural college last week on his return to Portland from Southern county teachers as well as Benton's Oregon. Mr. Johnson collects for educators. The exercises will occur nearly all the botanical gardens all over the world, and has orders for any kind of plant which is rare and beautiful and worthy of cultivation. He has not made any new discoveries of late, but for the past month has been traveling to all sorts of roots of rare and curious plants, removed at that time. In this collecting tour he has experienced many hardships and difficulties in finding the plants he was after, as they were mostly in altitudes of from 4,000 to 6,000 feet, and most of them were still buried under the
