

EXPERIENCED AND INFLUENTIAL

Hon. Binger Hermann was nominated for congress from the first Oregon district by the republican congressional convention at Eugene, last Thursday, after one of the most stubborn contests ever waged in a nominating convention in this district. Not until the 13rd ballot was the man named who will occupy the place in congress made vacant by the death of Mr. Tongue. Yet there was no bitterness, and the unsuccessful candidates for the honor will lead in the campaign for the election of Mr. Hermann.

WHAT MORE?

Why the managers of the Southern Pacific railroad company, or any person of prominence, should insist that Corvallis people do not want a train to run from Portland to Corvallis in the evening and return in the morning, is difficult to understand. It is said the assertion is made because Corvallis did not send a committee to interview the Southern Pacific managers with the committees from Independence and other towns.

But the Southern Pacific managers knew that the people of this city desired the train. Two or more years ago, a petition numerously signed by Benton county people was forwarded to the Southern Pacific managers asking that the train running to Independence in the evening, be extended to Corvallis and return in the morning. Every few weeks since that time the persons at Corvallis who sent that petition have interviewed the Southern Pacific officials and requested that the train be put on. A few weeks ago when Independence and other towns along the line sent petitions asking for the service, Mr. Wilkins circulated a petition asking for the service. He secured a long list of signatures. Several times since then citizens of Corvallis interested in the movement have seen the Southern Pacific officials and urged that the night and morning train be put on. It is difficult to understand what more Corvallis people could do to obtain the service.

The only reference made to Bryan at the democratic congressional convention at Albany, Saturday, was when the chairman announced that "wind-jammers are cut off."

No Fault of Commissioner.

EDITOR GAZETTE.—The operation of the national land laws is to figure in the present first Oregon congressional district campaign. Just why this is so is not exactly clear. Neither Mr. Hermann nor Mr. Reames, nor even our own Mr. Ingalls can be, in reason, blamed for those laws which have done much for the West and which also have given an opportunity for much fraud. These frauds have been accomplished under the various administrations and will continue as long as the land laws remain as they are.

In the matter of the conduct of the local land officials, it will be remembered that the commissioner of public lands has not the power to appoint or remove them, and the several Oregon local land commissioners who have been recently summarily retired, were appointed by a federal judge who happens to be a democrat. No one thinks of holding Judge Dellinger responsible for their alleged official misconduct. Mr. Hermann, when commissioner, urged congress constantly but vainly to amend the laws that the frauds could not be practiced.

Among the other realities that the opposition to Mr. Hermann will not discuss in connection with his administration of the

land office, is the fact that of the \$12,000,000 to \$15,000,000 which was handled by the office during his incumbency, not one cent was lost through defalcations or carelessness.

To those familiar with the situation it seems odd that the friendly relations between the President and Mr. Hermann should be questioned, for were those relations other than very friendly, Mr. Hermann would not have retained his office so long after Mr. Roosevelt's accession to the presidency. It is very unusual for a bureau chief to remain longer than the department desires, and Mr. Hitchcock has for several years urged Mr. Hermann's retirement. Their difference was not personal but was based upon several matters of policy in which Mr. Hermann had the support of the West. Mr. Hermann did not care to yield his convictions even to retain his office. That those unpreventable land frauds were not an issue is sufficiently shown by the fact that Mr. Hermann's assistant was made his successor.

Of really more importance to Oregon than a congressman's relations with the administration is his relationship with congress, and probably no Oregonian who reads and thinks will deny that no man in the state, other than Senator Mitchell, is closer to the influential members of congress than Binger Herman. Of especial importance to Oregon at this time is the fact that Mr. Hermann is on the most pleasant terms with Speaker Cannon.
