Dallas college has already played 11 games in the league series and has won ten of them by large scores. A tour of the whole Middle West next year is contemplated by the team.

Stole a Gun.

Since the details of the theft of Henry Leibner's team of horses were written up for publication, the information has been obtained that probably the same thief stole a new rifle and two boxes of cartridges from William Wagner, Friday.

Mr. Wagner keeps "batch" on a place belonging to Mrs. James McBee, four miles south of Corvallis and adjoining the Off Wilson place. The house occupied by Mr. Wagner is a mile and a half west of the Wilson home and stands back quite a distance from the main road.

A stranger appeared at Mr. Wagner's Friday morning about ten o'clock and asked for breakfast, which was given him. In reply to questions the traveler stated that he hailed from down near Portland and was going out to the "mills" to try for a position.

After his departure Mr. Wagner went to the field to work, giving no further thought to the matter. A little later, however, Mr. Wagner saw the same stranger return up the road and pass the house, but he did not notice whether the stranger approached the dwelling or not although he could easily have done so unobserved.

The stranger was large and dark complexioned, wearing a heavy brown beard and mustache.

Thursday a tramp stopped at the Henry Leibner home and asked for dinner but was refused. A telephone message to Mr. Leibner yesterday morning elicited the information that this tramp was "big and dark complexioned and had big whiskers all over his face and also wore a mustache."

The identity of the tramp and the man who stole the gun thus appears to be the same. The further fact that Mr. Wagner resides near the place where the stolen horses were found lends weight to the belief that the dark whiskered stranger is the guilty party.
