The Railroad Commission-

Senator Miller of Josephine county has introduced a bill "to create and establish a Board of Railroad Commissioners and to define and regulate its powers and duties and to fix the compensation thereof." Such a bill will necessarily attract much attention from the whole people of the State who have suffered so much from the extortions of the railroad companies now in existence. This bill provides for the election of three commissioners, two reunblicans and one democrat to be elected by the present legislature, which is to fix their selaries. They are to elect their clerk. The powers of the Board are to enquire into all the business of the companies and it has a right to examine their books for this purpose Their duties are prescribed in the 9th section, which provides that after personal examination it shall appear that repairs are necessary, or additions to the rolling stock or station houses, or that any "change in the rates or fare for transportation of freight or passengers is reasonable or necessary for the use of the public," etc., it shall be the that in the selection of officers, his ad- duty of the Board to notify the company, which shall be given a hearing, integrity and capability. GLIMPSES.

Of Men and Things, as Seen Through Our Own Oblored Glasses.

The death of SCHUYLER COLEAN brings into view that portion of American history in which he took an active part. Poor Colfax! He was just at the height of his popularity and the tidal wave would have borne him higher and higher when the Credit Mobilier exposure came. To no one not even Oakes Ames did that expos ure bring so much public contumely as to COLFAX. The former stood like giant at bay, admitted everything and claimed it to be honorable. Colfax equivocated, denied and was found guilty. He accepted hisfate with a good grace and as quietly as possible slipped out of public life and his bright hopes were gone forever. What a fall was there, my countryment Erastus C. BROOKS, the Democrat mixed up in the affair, took it harder even than COLFAX, and went home and died of a broken heart. But the heart-ache that COLFAX must have suffered all these long years can but be imagined. GARFIELD was more fortunate than any connected with the affair and the case against him was not made so clear, but even he lost that magnificent majority of 19,000 and was returned to Congress with a death struggle by a paltry 4,000. This saved him, and as Americans worship success his sin was forgiven him. BLAINE, of all the men accused by AMES alone came through the ordeal without a stain upon his escutcheon; would that he could have done so well in all cases. It may be safely doubted if any of the men interested knew what they were doing. It was a money making affair and had its legitimate side. That AMES never fully informed the investors cannot but be believed. It was a kind of 'blind pool,' and it is safe to say that Colfax, Garrield and others were more negligent than guilty. Yet for COLFAX it was the death knell to a long and honored public life; but around his earthly grave that has just been dug, there is nothing but sorrow and tears for one whose ambition and fame have long been burid in the grave of a political suicide.

What a great man is Thomas A. HENDRICKS! How the Hoesiers do leve him! Honest, able and brilliant he is the beau ideal of an American statesman. We love to think of a man-backed by the great strength of a great state and to know that he is worthy of that support. And then when that state is a doubtful one what magic does the man's name carry with it. When HENDRICK's name was added to that of CLEVELAND, instinctively a feeling of safety came to every Democrat and it flew from heart to heart: "Indiana is safe!" What would have been CLEVELAND's fate if the convention had tacked on a man like ENGLISH to him? I shudder to think of it. Would not HANCOCK and HEN-DRICKs have swept the country in 1880? may his name ever be enshrined in the heart of his countrymen.
