MR. JAMES VIRTUE, of Baker City, has had an exhibition at the Portland Mechanics' Fair his cabinet of Eastern Oregon ore, minerals and curiosities which has attracted a great deal of attention. This cabinet is, no doubt, a very fine one, and has been, if we are correctly informed, accumulated during many years, not from Baker county alone, but from every portion of this section of the State, and should have been exhibited as showing the resources of Eastern Oregon, or at least of Baker, Grant and Union counties. Mr. Virtue, however, with the characteristic cheek of the average Bakerite, claims for that place the credit of producing it all. A "map" of the country is also shown which makes it appear that Baker City is the natural center and supply point for all the mines in this portion of the State, and that other towns cannot possibly compete on account of inaccessible mountains, which appear on the "map" as plain as the nose on your face. All this is very amusing and very cheeky, about on a par with the articles that were recently sent from Baker to that very reliable (?) Journal the Portland News, in which all the mines of the Pine creek and Eagle districts were described as being in Baker county. We do not blame the people of any section for trying to put as good a face on their surroundings as they can, but do not think they are justified in such wholesale misrepresentations. If such methods are necessary in order to advance the interests of Baker county, the people can make use of them if they wish, but the only way we can account for some of the Union county papers copying the above mentioned articles and trying in their feeble way to give currency and credit to the same, is that the editors of those papers carry a vacuum around in their skulls which nature intended should be filled with brains.

It is significant that the most largely circulated paper in Pennsylvania, the Philadelphia Record, is a very earnest opponent of the high protective tariff. The Record's circulation grows, too, having increased within a few months from 105,000 daily to 113,500. The politicians would seem to have something to learn from the popularity of anti-high tariff papers the country over. The fact that a good many prominent Knights of Labor are asking the workmen to tell, if they can, what good the high tariff has done them, should also give the politicians a "pointer." Do they imagine the Knights are under the influence of British gold?

COMMISSIONER SPARKS recommends that an act be passed making false and fraudulent returns of public surveys and of private land claims offenses punishable by fine and imprisonment. The recommendation is also made that the law authorizing surveys to be made under the special deposit system be repealed. The Commissioner is making it as sultry for thieves as it is possible for one man to do.

NEW TO-DAY.

Notice to Bridge Builders.

Notice is hereby given that the County Court of Union county, Oregon, will receive sealed bids up till noon on Wednesday, November 3, 1886, for the building of a county bridge over the Grand River in the river at what is known as the Wilhelm crossing of said river. Said bridge to be built on stone abutments placed near each shore of river, and built in a substantial manner of solid stone masonry, laid in good lime mortar. The work to be similar in construction to the County bridge now being built over the Grand River at Elgin; but the County Court will not be confined strictly to any plan in considering bids, but will require the same to be in all of the best and most substantial manner. The Court will also receive sealed bids, at the same time and place, for the construction of a County bridge over the Wallowa river in the Lower Wallowa valley, near the Wallowa Post-office, which is at or near the dwelling house of L. J. Cole, to be constructed on good and solid masonry, filled with stone, of sound red fir timber, and in a substantial and workmanlike manner. The Court will also, at the same time and place, receive sealed bids for the construction of a bridge over Eagle creek on the county road leading from Union to Cornucopia, on what is generally known as the Pine Creek road, as follows: To be built on said Eagle creek far enough above where the bridge is to be put to put the bridge on ground sufficiently high to remove the necessity of building an approach to the bridge on the southwest side of said stream; to be placed on three cribs, on a level of red fir timber, down in diameter, and bolted together solidly and filled with stone; one crib to be placed near each shore, and the third crib to be placed near the center of the stream, after removing the stone and gravel as low as can be done before commencing the foundation of said cribs; then to place stringers of the best fir timber to be procured, down 10 by 12 in. in size, six abreast, and covered with sound timber, not less than six inches thick for flooring, and to grade a road eight feet wide, with easy turns, from said bridge, to intersect the county road below, on the northern side of said Eagle creek. To be paid for in County orders. The Court reserves the right to reject any and all bids.

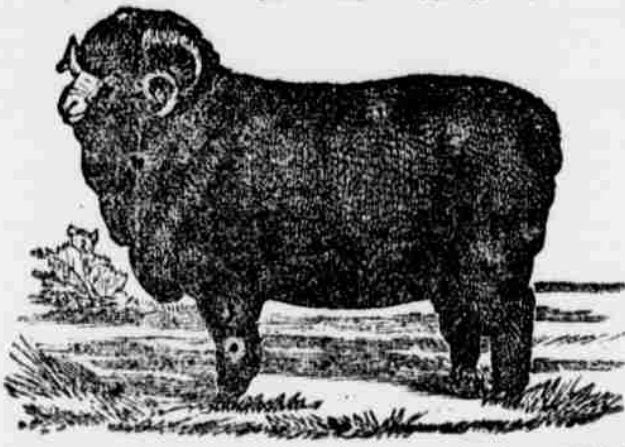

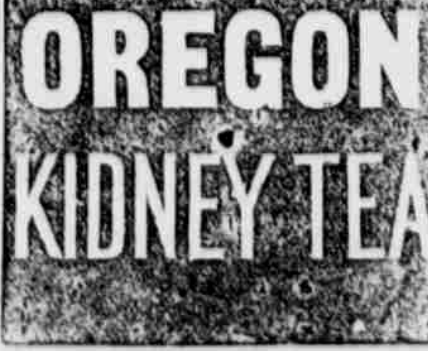
