Department of the Interior, General Land Office, Washington, D. C. April 22, 1892. Register and Receiver, La Grande, Or., Gentlemen:—I am in receipt of your letter of March 11, 1892, transmitting the appeal of Nathan W. Appington, from your decision rejecting his application to file for the e/s n/s, n/s, s/s, sec. 4 and s/w, n/s, sec. 3, tp. 2 n. r. 40 e.
