

WOULD OPEN UPPER RIVER.

Two Measures, Each Calculated to Accomplish Similar Ends.

Following is the text of Senate Joint Memorial, No. 1, introduced by Mays, of Multnomah, and which urges Congress to build at once a canal and locks at the Dalles of the Columbia River; "To the Honorable Senate and House of Representatives of the United States: "We, your memorialists, the Legislative Assembly of the State of Oregon, respectfully represent that the Columbia River, with the exception of a very short distance between The Dalles and Cahlo, in the State of Oregon, is navigable all the year for boats of average tonnage from the Pacific Ocean to Kettle Falls, in the State of Washington, a distance of more than 700 miles; that owing to the topography of the country through which said river flows, the producers of the vast region known as the Columbia Basin, which comprises an area of not less than \$2,300,000 acres, mostly arable land, can cheaply reach the markets of the world with their products only by means of the channel of the Columbia River, and for that reason the removal of all obstructions to navigation therein and the consequent reduction of transportation rates is a matter of most urgent necessity; that the obstructions to navigation alluded to can be overcome by the construction of properly equipped canal and locks at the points named; that a careful survey and plans for such canal and locks with detail drawings and estimates have been made under the direction of Captain W. A. Hart, Engineer Corps, U. S. A., which show that the probable cost of such improvement would not exceed \$3,969,000. "Your memorialists pray, therefore, that said improvement be speedily commenced and vigorously prosecuted to an early completion. "In the Senate yesterday Johnston, of Wasco and Sherman, introduced a bill for construction of a portage railroad between The Dalles and Celilo, and providing that \$200,000 be appropriated from the State Treasury for the purpose. The measure provides that the Governor, Secretary of State and State Treasurer and their successors in office shall be constituted a Board of Portage Commissioners, with full power to construct and operate the proposed portage road, and that they shall proceed immediately to take up those duties when the act shall have been passed.

Indorsed Roosevelt's Action.
Kansas City, Jan. 16.—The National Livestock Association in annual convention here yesterday afternoon by a rising vote, adopted a resolution indorsing President Roosevelt's suggestion that Congress appoint a committee of experts to settle the range problem, which for years has been the bone of contention between the cattle and sheep men.

Better Than the Fog.
London, Jan. 16.—For the first time in many years the Thames is frozen over. At Marlow the ice is nearly an inch thick. Drift ice has formed in solid packs on the river at Windsor and Richmond. Intensely cold weather prevails, which has largely increased the number of the unemployed, as much outdoor work has been suspended.

Don't Like that Committee Report.

Honolulu, Jan. 16.—There is much indignation and many protests here over the report of the Senate commission which was sent to the Senate last Monday.

That portion recommending the establishment of a National leper settlement at Molokai and the statement that there are many lepers in the islands outside the settlement is especially resented.

The resignation of Attorney-General E. P. Dole has been accepted. Dole will go to Washington to argue before the Supreme Court the Osaki Mankichi case, which grew out of the transition period and involves the application of the United States Constitution to Hawaii after the passage of the resolution of annexation.

Plague at Mazatlan.

Mazatlan, Mexico, Jan. 16.—Eight new cases of plague and four deaths were reported today, while four more of the lazzaretto patients are dying. A number of houses in different sections were burned today, having been infected with plague germs.

General Ezeta, ex-President of the Republic of Salvador, is very sick at the Civil Hospital.

Relief funds are coming in, and are most welcome. The situation is gloomy, and business is stagnant. The remarkable exemption of the Chinese residents from attacks of plague excites interest.

For Display at St. Louis.

Washington, Jan. 16.—The House committee on industrial arts and exhibits today authorized a favorable report on the bill appropriating \$100,000 for an agricultural college exhibit at the St. Louis fair. Amendments were made to the bill providing for an appropriation of \$50,000 to aid the residents of Alaska to make an exhibit at St. Louis, the cost of preparing and transporting to be borne by the residents of Alaska; also for an appropriation of \$25,000 for an Indian Territory exhibit, the residents of the territory being required to deposit an equal amount with the Treasury.

Kipling Cables His Refusal.

San Francisco, Jan. 16.—Rudyard Kipling has declined to permit the Ladies' Relief Society of Oakland to publish a calendar containing excerpts from his works. The calendar was to have been sold for the financial benefit of the Old Ladies' Home at Alden. The prominent society women who comprise the society, as well as the professors of the University of California who revised the chosen quotations, are much annoyed at Mr. Kipling's curt refusal by cable to permit the consummation of their charitable work.

President Signs Gladly.

Washington, Jan. 15.—Shortly after noon this afternoon, Representative Wachter, of Maryland, chairman of the House committee on enrolled bills, accompanied by Representative Allen, of Maine, reached the executive office with the engrossed and enrolled copy of the free coal bill passed by Congress yesterday. President Roosevelt received the committee and signed the measure, expressing at the same time his pleasure that Congress had acted so promptly.
