Conditions here cannot be compared with what are to be met with in Canada. I is true that there is a vast territory of fine looking country that is almost uninhabited. But why has this territory not been settled before. It was just as nice fifty years ago as it is now. There is something wrong. An appropriation of one tenth of this amount would be burdensome in this state, and it is not strange that our roads are not very good. Road conventions are necessary and proper and the matter should be taken up by each county. Much can be accomplished by the right kind of work.

House bill 107, introduced by Mr. Phelps, to provide for a more efficient method for assessment and collection of taxes, is a meritorious law, the effect of which will be realized by every taxpayer in the state.

This law eliminates that most objectionable feature in the old law in which taxes became delinquent in the spring, and changes the time of payment to fall.

No where in Mr. Phelps' law is there any is elence to exemptions. The main alterations made by the amendments in the Phelps bill are as follows:

Changes the time of making the assessment to January.

Changes time of making first payment and delinquency to December 31.

Reduces rebate for paying all taxes at same time from 3 to 2 per cent.

Changes delinquency penalty from 10 to 5 per cent.

Personal property shall be leyied upon wherever found.
