The cases of Maria Wade and Horace C. McKinley in the United States district court in Portland, have been continued until the first day of the next regular session of the court, which will bring them to trial about April 1, 1904.

**CLAIMS RECORD FOR CYCLING.**

German Journalist Has Traversed Five Continents on a Bicycle—Has Ridden 54,000 Miles.

William Schwiegerhausen, a journalist of Leipzig, Germany, claiming to be the only cyclist who has traversed the five continents on his wheel, recently arrived at St. Louis. In the last four years he has traveled 54,000 miles, and by the time he winds up his record-breaking trip the figures will reach 60,000. With two companions he left Germany in June, 1899. In 1900 one of the cyclists was left behind at Baurut. Later Schwiegerhausen and L. Werner were attacked by Bedouins in an Arabian desert and the latter killed. Undeterred, Schwiegerhausen traversed India, China, Australia, South and North America, and will complete his trip by wheeling to New York.

More relics of Roman London are being brought to light with the clearing away of Newgate's old foundations. Further remains of the Roman wall which once inclosed the city have been discovered on what was once a slope above the now vanished river Fleet.
