### CLAIMS RECORD FOR CYCLING.

German Journalist Has Traversed Five Continents on a Bicycle-Has Ridden 54,000 Miles.

William Schwiegerhausen, a journalist of Leipsic, Germany, claiming to be the only cyclist who has traversed the five continents on his wheel, recently arrived at St. Louis. In the last four years he has traveled 54,000 miles, and by the time he winds up his record breaking trip the figures will reach 60,000. With two companions he left Germany in June, 1899. In 1900 one of the cyclics was left behind at Bairut. Later Schwiegerhausen and L. Werner were attacked by Bedouins in an Arabian dezert and the latter killed. Undeterred, Schwiegerhausen traversed India, China, Australia, South and North wheeling to New York
