PROHIBITION WILL NOT PRO-HIBIT.

This will be the last issue of the Gazette prior to the election. But a few days yet remain for the wavering voter to make up his mind which way to vote on local Notwithstanding the arguments of our worthy opponent, Rev. Mount, the Gazette sees no good reason why it should change its a titude on this question. While we give these reformers credit for great sincerity and zeal in the effort to rid the country of an acknowledged curs, the evils of which can sc reely be reckoned, the advocates of prohibition fail utterly to show that their plan will minimize them. On the other hand the Gazette's showing goes uncontroverted that where such profits abound as exist in the saloon business, it will be carried on secretly or openly in spite of all prohibitory laws. The dcings of Carrie Nation in Kansas show plainly that in many places saloons are doing business openly, else there would be no mirrors to smash. Morrow county does not desire such a neverending fight as exists in Kansas and Maine, when no better results are promised than exist in those

states. To reinforce the statements and opinions of the Gazette we submit the following expressions of opinion by leading men of our nation: Governor Boies, writing on pro-

hibition in Iowa in 1890 said:

"I feel certain that more dis. tilled spirits are used as a b-verage in Iowa under the present law than has ever been or ever would be under a license system. I am equally certain that the spirits used are of the worst kind. There is not a doubt but that prohibition has failed to lessen the evils of intemperance, has retarded immigration into and hastened emigration from the state and constantly drained the state of immense sums of money sent to other states for the purchase of liquors. I do not believe that crime has been diminished or criminal expenses by this law, or that criminal convictions are less than before this law went into effect. Instead, thereof, if we count prosecutions, convictions and expenses incurred under this law, they have been greatly increased."

"After several years of trial of prohibition in this city that law has proved a miserable farce. The county has been put to an immense amount of trouble and .xpense, and all to no purpose.




