WILL HAVE GOOD EXHIBIT

MORROW COUNTY WILL NOT BE BEHIND AT FAIR.

Citizens Realize Benefits to be Derived From Proper Advertising at Exposition.

Morrow county will have an exhibit at the Lewis and Clark fair. This is now an asured fact.

To make a creditable exhibit will require the expenditure of about \$2,000. We are now sure of \$1500 and the prospects are that there will be no trouble in getting the required amount.

Owing to the short time and the necessity for decided action in getting matters arranged, Judge T. W. Ayers and Commissioner Blackman have been active during the past week in getting matters into proper shape.

Judge Ayers and Mr. Blackman interviewed the people of Ione last Thursday and since that time the enterprising Judge has been busy in interviewing the people and getting the sentiment in different parts of the county.

Judge Ayers has always been enthusiastic in having a good showing for Morrow county at the fair, and now that he finds that the people generally are behind the proposition and are willing to stand by a reasonable appropriation to do the work he is out with renewed vigor and earnestness to make our exhibit one that we shall be proud of.

This is something that every citizen of Morrow county should take an interest in. While it is a fact that work of this kind usually devolves upon a few people, this is something that everyone who is interested in the welfare of Morrow county should be will to shoulder a little of the responsibility.

It is time to commence to get our best products together. Everyone who has something worthy of exhibit should confer with Judge Ayers, Commissioner Blackman or someone who will take enough interest to see that the products are properly installed. We need the co-operation of all the people. Let us do something.

AS HAPPY AS A BOY.

President Roosevelt Starts For Rest in Mountains.

Washington, April 3—With cheers and good wishes resounding at the Pennsylvania depot, the President at 9:05 A. M. today, on a special train started a trip through the South. Among those at the station were many friends of the President, including Postmaster-General Cortelyou and Secretary Metcalf, of the Department of Commerce and Labor.

The special train consists of three cars, the President's private car Reckele, the Pullman sleeper Forest, and the combination baggage and buffet car Viceroy. Attached to the train, to be run as far as Baltimore as a buffer, was a day coach. The train is handsomely fitted, and contains every known appliance to insure the comfort and safety of the passengers.

The train was scheduled to leave at 9 o'clock, but it was a minute after that hour when the President arrived at the station. He had been delayed at the White House for a few minutes in signing some important papers. Even after he boarded his car, some papers were handed to him for his signature.

It was just five minutes after the scheduled time of departure when the train drew out of the station.

In the party besides the President were Secretary Loeb, General S. B. M. Young, Dr. Alexander Lambert, Lieutenant G. R. Fortesque, one of the President's aides; M. C. Lata and J. L. McGrew, stenographers to the President; H. A. Stachmeyer, photographer, and representatives of the newspaper press associations.

The trip is being primarily made to enable the President to attend the reunion of his old regiment, the Rough Riders, which is to be held at San Antonio, Tex., next Friday, and to hunt big game in Oklahoma and Colorado. Incidentally the President will deliver notable addresses at several places en route. His first important stop will be made at Louisville, Ky., tomorrow morning, where he will be the guest of the city for a few hours. He will go directly to St. Louis, and thence via the Missouri, Kansas & Texas Railroad to San Antonio, stopping at several places on the way. Among them Sherman and Dallas, Tex.

After leaving San Antonio, the President will go to Oklahoma for a wolf hunt and will proceed thence to Colorado to hunt big game in the mountains. Unless it should be necessary on account of unforeseen circumstances to curtail the trip, the President will be absent from Washington about two months. Definite plans for the trip after he shall leave Oklahoma have not been made, the purpose of the President being to adjust his plans to the conditions as they may exist at the time. While he expects to be in the wilds of Colorado for a considerable time, he will keep in constant touch with Washington by means of couriers to the nearest telegraph station, and thus will be enabled to attend to such important business as may demand his personal attention.

Dr. Lambert, who accompanies the President, is his physician, and has hunted throughout the country the President will visit.

Gave Guns to Tracy.

Salem, Or., March 31.—Officers of this county feel certain that they have located the men responsible for smuggling guns and ammunition into the state penitentiary over two years ago, by which convicts Harry Tracy and David Merrill effected their sensational escape, after killing three guards, and that they have sufficient evidence upon which to secure conviction.

The men charged with the crime are Harry Wright, serving a three years' sentence in Walla Walla prison under the name of H. C. Mutehart, for grand larceny, and Charles Monte, at present doing a six-year sentence in the Oregon penitentiary for grand larceny under his name of W. Bennett. Officers can lay hands upon either or both at pleasure and the case will be brought before the state grand jury which convenes here next Monday.

A charge of murder in the first degree will be entered against both men. The guards killed during Tracy and Merrill's famous outbreak were Frank Ferrell, S. R. T. Jones and B. T. Tiffany.
