

SECRECY OF THE BALLOT.

Citizen Who Will Not Give His Political Affiliation May Not Vote at Primaries.

The validity of that portion of the direct-primary law which requires a voter to register his party affiliations has been questioned by residents of Clackamas County, who have presented the matter to the Attorney-General for his opinion.

The Attorney-General says that in view of this plain provision, it would be impossible for him to hold otherwise than that it is the duty of election judges to reject the ballot of any person who has refused to register his party affiliations.

The point the Clackamas people raise is that the requirement of registration is a violation of the secrecy of the ballot, for such registration gives notice to the world which party the voter belongs to.

One purpose of the direct primary law was to prevent the members of one party from participating in the primary election of another party.

The direct primary law does not, therefore, make any change so far as the secrecy of the ballot is concerned.

WHITNEY FOR STATE PRINTER.

Candidate for Renomination at Republican Primary April 20.

A mistaken idea prevails to some extent as to the emoluments of the State Printer and the practical workings of the office.

In the first place the appropriation for "printing" conveys a wrong impression. The biennial appropriation is not for printing alone, but includes also the cost of paper, ruling, election supplies and many small items, amounting for the biennial period to about \$23,000.

Printer does not get.

Thus it will be readily seen that when the cost of production of the printing is taken into consideration, the State Printing Office is not all profit.

Criticism has for years been directed at the State Printing Office and it seems that it still continues. The present State Printer has been accused of graft, of evading the profit of the office with political bias, and of a further division for the use of the state printing plant.

The fees paid the State Printer are fixed by law, and every item printed is measured by an expert printer appointed by the Governor, whose duty it is to measure the printing and affix the amount due as provided by law.

The State Printing Office is a target of a lack without just reason. The heavy cost of printing in past years has been chiefly due to the large number of copies printed.

I have given this subject careful study, and believe there are two methods by which the cost of printing could be kept down to a minimum.
