NEW RULING.

Purchasers of Isolated Tracts Must Swear It is for Their Own Use.

The following new ruling has just been issued by R. A. Ballinger, commissioner of the General Land Office. Hereafter the sale of isolated and disconnected tracts of public lands will not be ordered under the act of June 27, 1906, (34 Stats., 517), on application therefor, unless the applicant shall, in addition to the showing now required, swear that he desires to purchase the land described in his application for his own individual use and actual occupation and not for speculative purposes. All pending applications for such lands under which sales have not heretofore been ordered are hereby rejected, and you are directed to notify the applicant hereof; and hereafter you will not receive and forward any applications for such sales which are not supported by the oath herein required.
