Wrong Views of the Census.

Letters from the census supervisors to the United States Census Bureau show the erroneous apprehensions of a considerable element of the population that their answers to the enumerators' questions in the next census, beginning April 15, this year, will cause increased taxation, legal entanglements, or injurious consequences to their person and property.

In order to quiet such unfounded fears, which would, unless removed, materially affect the accuracy of the census, the bureau has prepared an official statement relative to the decennial census, its origin, purpose and uses.

This statement should furnish complete assurance to those concerned that information given to the enumerators is held by the Census Bureau in the strictest confidence with reference to the identity of the informants, as required by the policy of the bureau and commanded by the law of the United States.

The bureau earnestly hopes that clergymen, priests, physicians, school teachers, employers and other public spirited citizens who come in contact with large numbers of people, will co-operate with the bureau by telling persons who are believed to entertain erroneous opinions of the census the real facts and urging them to give full replies to the enumerators. Teachers are particularly requested to speak of the census to the school children and ask them to tell their parents about it.

The statement issued by the bureau explains that the Constitution requires a census of the population to be taken every ten years in order to reapportion state representation in the National House of Representatives. It is the means also to ascertain the increase in the population, agriculture, industries, and resources of the nation since the last census.

It is emphatically declared, by the statement, that the information sought from the people of the United States is used solely for general statistical purposes. It will neither be published nor used in any other way to disclose facts regarding any individual or enterprise. The census, it goes on to say, is not, never has been, and cannot be employed to obtain information that can be used in any way in the assessment of property for purposes of taxation or the collection of taxes, either national, state or local; or for deportation proceedings, extradition measures,

army or navy conscription, internal revenue investigations, compulsory school attendance, child-labor law prosecutions, quarantine regulations, or in any way to affect the life, liberty, or property of any person.

It points out that replies to the enumerators are and must be held by the Census Bureau in strict and absolute confidence. All the bureau officials, supervisors, supervisors' clerks, enumerators, and interpreters, before entering upon their duties, are obliged to take a solemn oath not to disclose any information they may obtain, except to the Census Bureau, and a violation of the United States law in regard to this oath means a \$1,000 fine or imprisonment for two years or both, in the discretion of the court.

Hill Interests Will Advertise Oregon.

Oregon is to get wide publicity throughout the East during the coming year if the plan of Louis W. Hill, president of the Great Northern Railway, works out. Mr. Hill proposes to gather exhibits of what Oregon raises and place them in an exhibit car which will be sent East and routed through the sections of the country where it will do the most good. That these exhibits will accomplish a great deal, accompanied as they will be by a lecturer, is certain and that many thousands of settlers will be brought to this state as a direct result is believed.

An actual demonstration of what this state can produce in fruits, grains, grasses, vegetables, etc., will unquestionably prove convincing to the Easterner. Attractive literature will accompany the exhibit car, telling of opportunities here for the homeseeker and the lecturer will answer questions about the state. President Hill asks support for his plan from Oregon people in the gathering of exhibits with which to equip the car. His company now has representatives in this state collecting information to be used in the advertising campaign to be waged by Mr. Hill.

Another Demonstration Train.

The first demonstration train to be sent out this year by the O. R. & N. Co. will be the largest and most complete ever prepared since the idea was first conceived and carried into action by Traffic Manager R. B. Miller, according to the Portland Journal. It will leave here March 21 for eastern Oregon, to remain 10 days on the road.

The train will consist of 10 cars and a locomotive, seven cars to be devoted to exhibits, agriculture, horticulture, livestock, poultry and farming machinery and implements. The entire exhibit will be in charge of 12 members of the faculty of the Oregon Agricultural college, who will deliver lectures along the route.

The itinerary will be made up some time next week, and the intention is to make about 30 stops, three each day. The train will go as far east as Baker City and into the Wallowa county.

The character of the lectures will be governed largely by conditions in the various districts and they are intended to be instructive in a way that will result in larger traffic for the railroad company going to the expense of equipping it.

The stock car will carry several head of fancy stock from the college farm, and the poultry car will carry a colony house such as a farmer can build at small cost. The poultry house will illustrate how to guard against insect pests and best systems of feeding. Brooders and incubators will also be shown in operation.

The horticultural car will have an exhibit of packed fruit and fruit in course of packing, and this, it is believed, will prove a very valuable exhibit in view of the great interest taken in that industry in this state.

Hood River is to have a big new hotel.

Fifty-nine car loads, over 650 tons, of hay were shipped out of Wallowa county in January.

The Milton Fruitgrowers' Union held a very enthusiastic meeting. Last year it handled \$112,375 worth of fruit.

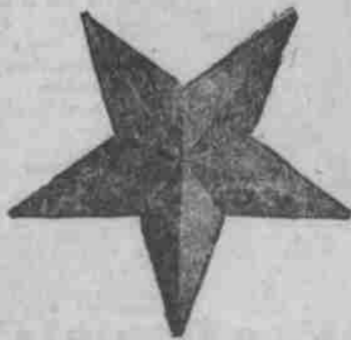
