Outlook Unfavorable.

Boston, May 21.—The Commercial Bulletin says of the wool market. The outlook in the wool market is not favorable. For goods are not selling satisfactorily and it is questioned whether light-weight fabrics opening during the next two months will move in sufficient volume to start up the worsted industry. Apparently the bottom has been reached on wool values and they are on an equitable basis, but consumers will not operate other than in a conservative way, except in isolated instances.

About 500,000 pounds of Oregon staple were sold this week at 62c to 63c, scoured, and Wyoming staple sold at 63 to 64c. Ohio and Michigan quarter-bloods and three-fourths changed hands fairly well at 29c and 30c, respectively.

With these exceptions, business is limited to unimportant quantities and no one seems to know just what wool is really worth today.
