Shepherd is again out for congress. Shepherd is certainly a persistent if not a successful candidate.

Judge Lowell is again in the hands of his friends for governor. And why not? The judge has been a standing candidate for about everything on the calendar for all these years. The "independent" and "non-partisan" papers are loud in their praise of the judge. This is only natural. If turned down he will bolt the ticket. If nominated he couldn't be elected.

All of the western wheat growing districts are harvesting a short crop. Montana, Southern Alberta, and the middle west have suffered from drouth. Here in Morrow county we are harvesting an average crop. Morrow county's 1,800,000 bushels of wheat will be a great help to business interests. Not such a bad wheat county after all when you come to think about it, and our wheat lands can be bought cheaper than any other wheat lands in the west.

The determination of Heppner business men to establish an active and working organization for the advancement of Morrow county interest should be encouraged by everybody. Morrow county's progress has been retarded by lack of enterprise on the part of her own citizens. Here we have a small expanse in territory with not enough population for a good sized country village. Certainly, we have opportunities that should be made known. Outside people know nothing about the resources of Morrow county, and this is the reason that they go other places and pay from \$50 to \$75 per acre for no better land than can be bought here for \$20 an acre.

The Gazette absolutely refuses to enter into long winded controversies over prohibition. However, the presentation of a few facts from time to time will do no harm on any question. The question of prohibition will be voted on here in Morrow county at the next election. We have conditions in Morrow county that must be met and decided by Morrow county people. Conditions that exist at the present time that cannot be avoided. We are not taking up issues 6,000 years of age, nor are we deciding for a dozen generations in the future. To the people who are really interested in the welfare of Mor-

row county, the people who live here, who keep up the county by the payment of taxes, the Gazette would like to call attention to the following facts: After you have read a long winded prohibition article, just go back and look up your tax receipts for the past two years under the dry regime, then keep your eyes open in the town of Heppner every evening for about a week as to the moral conditions, then go back and read the prohibition article again and see how much merit there is left in it. Prohibition under present conditions is a farce and a failure and this fact cannot be successfully denied.

Light Registration.

Voters are very slow to register. With less than three weeks in which to register only one third of the voters have registered.

Will Test Huntley Act.

Salem, Or., Aug. 19.—W. S. U'Ren, of Oregon City, was here today and declared this morning that he was searching for some candidate through whom he could start mandamus proceedings against the Secretary of State to compel that officer to accept for publication in the pamphlet illustrations and matter, when the candidate had led his petition signed by the requisite number of electors after August 14.

It is the intention of Mr. U'Ren to make a test case of this feature of the Huntley act to have the courts determine just what is the legal interpretation of the word "petition." T. B. Kay, of this city, Republican candidate for the office of State Treasurer, was visited by U'Ren, as the Oregon City solon desired to use Kay in an endeavor to mandamus the Secretary. Kay did not wish to enter into the fight and U'Ren will have to look elsewhere. It is understood he returned to Oregon City this afternoon for the purpose of securing the

services of some candidate from Clackamas County.

There are numerous candidates who have come in with their petitions completely filled out after August 1, the day that Chief Clerk Corey has decided was the last time for filing if the candidates desired to take advantage of the pamphlet privileges under the Huntley act.

Several of them desire to secure such a place in the pamphlet and consequently the proposed step which may be taken by U'Ren is of paramount interest just at present to many parties, factions and candidates.

Final time for filing declarations will expire at 5 o'clock next Monday afternoon. No petitions for nomination will be accepted after that time, neither will copy for the pamphlets, as the law requires that the Secretary of State must have his copy in the hands of the State Printer August 25.
