The Hospital.

The decision of Bishop C. J. O'Reilly, of Baker City, to erect a hospital at Heppner, means the expenditure here within the coming months of \$40,000.00 at least in the construction of the building and its equipment. Citizens of Heppner and vicinity have already subscribed nearly \$10,000.00 to the fund, and it will doubtless be more than this when the canvass is completed. Our citizens entered into this matter with a vim that is inspiring, and an indication, as well, of returning confidence. Heppner has been considered by some to be on the backward track, but this is a demonstration of the confidence that our business community and citizens at large have in the future of the town.

In answer to a direct question put to him as to what amount of funds he would put into the hospital in proportion to what was raised in Heppner, Bishop O'Reilly emphatically stated he would put up four dollars to one.

While the hospital may not prove to be a second St. Vincents, it will be just as good as far as it goes, and should be the means of drawing a large amount of business to Heppner that has been going to the city. There is a very large territory to draw from and proper facilities for handling all classes and conditions of patients will give a first class institution of this kind at this point plenty to do, and it may be but a very few years until the hospital will have to be enlarged very materially to care for those seeking its services.

This is a chance for some of our bright pupils in the various high schools of the county to earn some pin money, the prizes being offered to encourage love of our country and the study of its history.

The present condition of our main street from the power house to the depot is frightful and a mighty poor advertisement for the town.
