About Country Roads.

Now that the people of each road district in Wallowa county have elected their road supervisors, it is believed that these men will fully appreciate the importance of the trust that has been placed in their hands.

Road making and repairing, as all other industries, has made vast improvements in the last few years in many portions of the United States, while in other parts roadwork is carried on in the same old fashion that prevailed fifty years ago. By the old way vast sums of money and an infinite amount of labor are expended upon roads to little or no betterment of their condition. In winter and spring they are but streaks of mud worked into a perfect loblolly by passing feet, and torn into exasperating ruts by plunging wheels; after the dryer season sets in the sun and wind dry up the mud to leave the road only a perplexing maze of deep ruts, jolting clods and chuckholes, to be followed later by a bed of dust waiting for the touch or breath of wind to rise in choking clouds to torment passing man or beast.

These conditions are not only disagreeable but expensive.

They levy a heavy tribute upon all farm produce by increasing the cost of moving it, and by their existence detract from the farm income and materially lessen the value of his land.

The United States Agricultural Department deeming good country roads an indispensable adjunct to the farm, has organized a Bureau for the special purpose of "Public Road Inquiries."

The present Congress appropriate \$30,000 to enable the Bureau to gather information about country road making, and to distribute that information among the people.

In addition to gathering and publishing information among people about road making and repairing, the Department will upon a sufficient showing, send expert road makers into the country to inspect and give information to road supervisors, as to the most approved and cheapest means of making and keeping country roads in good condition.

Any supervisors of Wallowa county who desire to learn about the latest and most approved way of working roads will be furnished with much valuable data, by addressing Maurice Q. Eldridge, Assistant Director of Public Road Inquiries, Washington, D. C.

PULLMAN ORDINARY SLEEPERS.

The tourist travel between the East and the Pacific Coast has reached enormous proportions in the last few years, and calls for a special class of equipment. To meet this demand the Pullman Company has issued from its shops what it technically calls the "Pullman Ordinary Sleeper." These cars appear similar to the regular sleepers being built on the same plan, but not furnished with the same elegance. They are equipped with mattresses, blankets, sheets, pillows, pillow-cases, towels, combs, brushes, etc., requiring nothing of the kind to be furnished by the passenger. Each car has a stove for making tea and coffee and doing "light housekeeping," and each section can be fitted with an adjustable table. A uniformed porter accompanies each car, his business being to make up berths, keep the car clean and look after the ants and comforts of the passenger. In each of the trains which are dispatched daily from Portland by the O. R. & N. Co. is to be found one of these "Pullman Ordinary Sleepers." The car attached to the "Chicago-Portland Special" goes through to Chicago without change, and the one in the "Atlantic Express" runs to Kansas City without change. Passengers in this car for Chicago change to a similar car at Granger.

Much of the first class travel is being carried in these cars, the rates being lower, and the service nearly equal to that in the palace sleepers.
