The Mechanical By Ian Tregillis

Book review by Susie Voth What fun it is to travel back in time to 1926 and visit New France (the country now known as Canada), the Netherlands and France. "The Mechanical" is a blend of alternate history and steampunk genres.

The book is populated with a variety of mechanicals called Clakkers.

There are military mechanicals created for their strength and military capabilities.

Stemwinders, the rarest, most feared, and mysterious type of Clakkers, have four legs and four arms and do not communicate, but blindly follow orders.

Finally, the servitor-class mechanicals, the lowest of the Clakkers, built to serve their human masters, and ultimately the Rightful Monarch of the Dutch Empire, Queen Margreet. Jax is a servitor Clakker.

Through his thoughts and actions, the reader learns that Clakkers are not merely machines: they have desires.

However, any action on their desires is prevented by a "geas" or obligation set by a Clakkers' owner. Any attempt to delay the completion of geas is prevented by pain. The longer a Clakker delays, the more severe the pain. Jax heard rumors of rogue Clakkers, Clakkers that don't suffer the pain of geas, and don't follow orders. but have free-will.

One such rogue was captured and brought before Queen Margreet, who demanded he kneel before her. "No," said the Clakker to the queen. "I prefer not." The queen could not allow this Clakker to survive — however, in his final moments, when humans heard the clattering of fear, Clakkers heard something quite different — Clockmakers lie.

The audiobook is most excellently read by Chris Kayser. He was able to pronounce words specifically made-up for this book. That is quite a feat, particularly the names of the Clakkers such as Jalyksegethistrovantus (so much easier to just say Jaz).
