There is one point in connection with D. P. Thompson's present visit to the East that does not seem to us in consonance with the dignity of his alleged mission. It is the statement that he intends "looking around New York and Philadelphia to see what two tugs can be purchased for."

RECENTLY on the trial of a man for burglary in a northern California county, the judge charged the jury that the possession of stolen property was a strong circumstance tending to show guilt. The man was convicted, and on appeal gets a new trial by the State Supreme Court, on the sustained demurrer that the possession of stolen property is a circumstance only, the jury to be sole determining power whether it be strong or weak.

SPEAKING of Japanese etiquette, a traveler from Japan says, that though the prescriptions of Japanese etiquette are many, and even onerous at times, it is not in these formalities that the much-talked-of Japanese courtesy essentially consists, but in the modest self-restraint of demeanor, the promptness to oblige, the unsleeping care to avoid whatever might by any possibility annoy or offend and the peculiar gentleness of tone and manner which render the Japanese, whatever his rank or position may be, so truly a model "gentle" man in the proper and authentic sense of the word.

In the course of Supt. Powell's remarks last Friday evening, we were glad to learn that Oregon stands high on the list of states rated for the minimum of illiteracy. He stated that the last compilation of educational statistics to hand showed that but three and eight hundredths per cent of Oregon's population were unable to read or write. The state standing first on the list is Iowa, which has but one and three quarters per cent of her inhabitants devoid of the rudiments of education. In this matter Oregon ranks New York, Pennsylvania and Ohio.

A NEW church has been organized in Salt Lake by a number of Mormons who claim that Brigham Young introduced the doctrine of polygamy and blood atonement, contrary to the original belief. They renounce polygamy and refuse to pay any more tithes.

ZEALOUS reformers in Indiana have twice with dynamite blown up a saloon that was obnoxious to them; a very demolishing argument.

An exchange thinks that the printer's trade is not nearly so good as some others; probably, but comparatively few persons now learn that trade in more than one of its departments. If one person had to learn all there is in it, as in the days of the earlier members of the craft, it would be the most difficult of all trades, and require a higher order of ability than any other mechanical pursuit. To some extent the principle applies in all occupations. There is probably no structure more complicated, and requiring a higher degree of mechanical skill in its construction than an iron steamship. But nearly all the work is done by unskilled laborers. There are hundreds of different operations, and to learn either one of them requires but little time; by combining them all the finished result is obtained.
