Teachers Institute.

On Friday morning session the subject of arithmetic, primary instruction, was taken up by Mrs. Coon, who ably and plainly illustrated her method of teaching the beginners in counting, enumeration, notation and the four fundamental rules of the science.

The subject was further discussed in the primary and higher classes by Miss Brown, Superintendent Parker, Mr. Coon, Miss Allen, Mr. Sloop and others, when, after ten minutes' recess, the subject of school government was taken up, discussed, explained, and criticised by nearly all the teachers present, and especially by Miss Brown, Mr. Coon, Mr. Sloop, Mrs. Coon and Rev. J. V. Milligan. Adjourned to 1.30 P. M.

The closing exercises of the institute were held at the Congregational Church in the evening, and were very interesting. Notwithstanding there were other social gatherings at the same hour at other places in the city, which took away the musical portion of the performance after the opening piece.

The literary proceedings commenced with an essay on "Discipline in the School Room" by Miss F. E. Brown, which, excellent in matter and delivered in the fittest manner, elicited the quick applause of the audience.

This was followed by an address on "Moral Instruction in the School Room," by J. F. Halloran.

Professor L. J. Powell followed, closing the proceedings with an elaborate and powerful lecture on the present status of education in Oregon, the need of improvement, and also of more cordial co-operative action between teachers and directors of schools.

An attentive audience listened throughout the proceedings, and with many thanks for the instruction and pleasure afforded by the Institute meetings of the two evenings, including the good music by the choir, the audience was dismissed.

Two Men Drowned. MOUTH OF NEHALEM, TILLAMOOK CO., JAN. 10, 1882.

EDITOR ASTORIAN: I write to inform you of the drowning of two men—Dr. C. Young and A. C. Lamb, near the mouth of Nehalem river, on Friday, the 8th day of January.

The facts, so far as known, are as follows: Mr. Thomas, living on Tillamook bay, having been quite unwell for some time past, and feeling that it was necessary to have a physician, sent Mr. Lamb to procure the services of Dr. Young, who was at that time teaching school on the north side of Nehalem river, some four miles above the mouth.

Mr. Lamb started on Thursday, the 5th, and went as far as Hatt & Richardson's place at the mouth of Nehalem, remaining over night, and Friday morning took a small canoe and started across the river, to where Dr. Young was teaching. Late Friday evening an Indian, (Nehalem John), was passing up the river, and found the canoe that Mr. Lamb had started in, capized and blown ashore on the south side of Nehalem, something over a mile from the mouth.

It is evident that Mr. Lamb was returning with Dr. Young across the Nehalem when they were drowned, as Dr. Young's hat was picked up by the writer Saturday morning, the 7th, on the ocean beach at the mouth of the river, and on Sunday, the 8th, Messrs. Brown and Johnson found the doctor's saddle-bags, containing his medicines; they were picked up a short distance from the mouth, on the south bank of the river. This is all that is known at present concerning the fate of these unfortunate men, their bodies having not been found up to the date of writing.

Dr. Young has not been long a resident of Tillamook county, and we suppose but little is known here concerning his history; the writer has heard him speak of living in Corvallis, Benton county, a year or so ago.

Mr. Lamb has been living in Tillamook county some five or six years; he was formerly from Arkansas.
