What shall happen ere the Ides of March? The City of Chester arrived in yesterday.

The Yakima is to be stocked with carp and catfish. The Western Belle is still lighting at St. Helen's.

The Edderside is receiving wheat at Brown & Co's dock. The Eureka came down yesterday and will cross to-day.

The editor of the Baker County Reveille has no conscience. The Yaquina is having three iron bulkheads put in at Portland.

Seattle saw mill men will advance the price of lumber after to-day. If you want to buy a boat, attend Holden's auction sale this morning.

February went out in drizzle and mist, and now we look for fair weather. A snow fall of 26 feet in Snoqualmie pass makes the folks think that winter abideth.

The Pioneer Restaurant advertises superior accommodations under the new management. The British bark Argosy and Scotia are ready for sea. The two cargoes are worth \$100,048.

The statement of the earnings of the O. R. & N. Co. for January, 1882, shows a net earning of \$190,506. Guiteau sends his steak back to the prison cook, and says he wants the blood running out of his meat when he gets it.

The Walla Walla paper publishes men that don't pay their wash bills. That may be a part of the illimitable province of journalism, but, hardly. The editor of the Standard wants it distinctly understood that he is not a candidate for State printer. It is always manners to wait till you are asked.

The old spiling on the vacant space south of Brown & Co's dock is being removed; new spiles will be driven and the entire space covered with a warehouse. It is said that the Utah and Northern railroad runs parallel to the Northern Pacific from Bedford to Helena, M. T., the distance between the two roads averaging about 200 yards.

A petition for a road from the Scandinavian Packing Co's cannery at Upper Astoria, by the most practicable route, to Titus' place on John Day, will be presented at the next session of the County court. At 2 P. M. yesterday, the bank in the rear of the Angel house, near the angle in the roadway to Upper Astoria, slid, demolishing a shed in the rear of the house and turning the building on its foundation.

The Foley Springs have been sold at public sale to Peter Rooney, for \$825. The Guard says that this is not one-half what the improvements cost the late proprietor, Dr. Foley, and thinks the sale will not be confirmed by the County court. There is no foolishness about those Mexican editors; two of them, Senors Morelo and Savorito, fought a duel last week in Guadalajara, and each fell dead at the first fire. There is an instructive moral in this little tale, to belligerent knights of the paste pot.

Columbia Clearances

During November 1881 there were twenty-one cargoes cleared from here, with an aggregate value of \$1,246,983; during December nineteen vessels cleared with a total value of \$1,082,700; during January '82, twenty cargoes cleared, the value of the January clearances being \$1,015,928; and in February nineteen vessels cleared; the value of the February clearances was \$1,203,315. The total for the last four months foreign clearances from the Columbia is \$4,548,911.

Salmon Trade

The salmon trade of the Pacific coast last year is represented briefly in the figures following: There was on hand January 1, 1881, 119,000 cases. The Columbia river pack was about 540,000 cases; the Frazer and Skeena river, 159,000 cases; the Sacramento river pack, 170,000 cases; the Puget Sound and all other sources, 42,150 cases. Total exports to Great Britain, Australia and the Eastern States, and the home consumption, are estimated at 958,784 cases. The quantity on hand March 1, 1882, is estimated at 11,000 cases.

Neighborly Comment

Another wheat laden vessel, outward bound, has been wrecked at the mouth of the Columbia river. This time the cause is assigned to tidal waves. Heretofore the loss of a vessel has been laid at the doors of most everything else by the Oregon papers. The pilots, captains of the vessels, winds, Providence and the devil, have all had their blame to bear, until it has now got down to tidal waves. There are quite a number of things by which the blame can yet be laid to, before they get down to the real cause—the bar at the mouth of the Columbia river.—Olympia Transcript.

Fire Delegates

The board of delegates, A. F. D., met Monday night and went through the regular order of business. No. 1's gave notice of election of Messrs. Vernon, Vaughn, Seaman and Ferrell. No. 2's gave notice of election of Messrs. Parrish and Kelchly and the death of Aaron Morton.

Messrs. Parker, Stockton, and Berry with Chief Engineer Trenchard, were made a committee to correct rules and regulation and draft an ordinance for the protection of firemen while at fires—to be ready for printing with the city ordinances.

Considerable trouble is being occasioned in relation to the Garfield county seat. The alleged reasons for denying it to Pomeroy is that that burg did not receive a majority of all the votes cast, and that \$3000 was judiciously distributed where it would do the most good.

The City of Salem company organized last Friday. Among the stated objects of the corporation is to construct and operate steamboats and barges on the Columbia and Willamette rivers, between the head of navigation on both to Astoria and the mouth of the former, or on any or all of their tributaries.

Few things are more needed in Clatsop county at present than new roads. One great drawback to the settlement of this section is the lack of means of communication. We can never expect to have this country settled up and made productive till roads are built, that producers can travel on, instead of waiting for a boat that can not, by reason of the elements, at all times be depended on.

The following is from the Oregonian, and now that it is in print, we consider ourselves absolved from any promise of not "saying anything about it." "The British Columbia Packing company, of which F. C. Reed is president and D. C. Ireland secretary, have recently bought the salmon cannery of Finlayson & Burrill, on Frazer river, three miles below New Westminster. Mr. Ireland will leave in a few weeks for Frazer river to superintend the cannery during the coming season."

The Californian for March is on our table. It is always picked up before the Eastern magazines and read with pleasure. In this number is an article on citrus culture of value, and a memoir of the celebrated filibuster Walker, whose expedition to Central America and tragic death is a matter of remembrance to many. A thoughtful article on immigration is the best paper in the current number, and the usual variety of fiction and poetry furnishes mental pabulum for lighter hours. Lock Melone comes in with his alleged wit, but 'tis like working over old tailings; a little more freshness in that department would be appreciated.
