VILLARD'S DOWNFALL.

From New York come varied notes of comment concerning Villard's abdication, all voiced in the same key. One stockholder said: "There has long been great dissatisfaction over the condition of affairs of all the Villard companies. Since the extent of the indebtedness of the Oregon Transcontinental company has been developed, this feeling has increased, and it was determined that some change must be made at once. Was his policy ever so sagacious the suspicion which has become attached to his actions renders him like unto Jonah, who must be thrown overboard or the ship will sink. For the present, but only nominally, Frederick Billings has resigned from the Oregon and Transcontinental directors, and will take charge of the Northern Pacific railroad again. He abandoned one to save the other. His stock was sold last week, and was among the long stock then unloaded. He was disgusted with the way the blind pool was conducted, and disagreed with his colleagues on matters of sentiment as well. Villard is probably a millionaire, but not more. When he loses the Northern Pacific presidency his revenues will be decreased all of \$50,000 a year. His two big houses will be too large for him then. There is a large mortgage on the place now."

The opinion in Wall street is that the change is the best thing which could occur for the company interests, and Billings, being the first president, has a better knowledge of this system of roads than any other man living. He is several times a millionaire, and the public has confidence in him. His policy will be a conservative one, and he will favor retrenchment. "The change can't be for the worse in any event," said a prominent operator.

John B. Hilliard, a well-known broker, is reported as saying: "It is such a position as Vanderbilt was placed in when he resigned the presidency of the New York Central. When an officer sees that the stock of his company is booming and the stockholders are making money, it is for his interest to remain in the company, perhaps. When these stocks begin to decline and only one officer is making any money out of the concern, there is naturally dissatisfaction. President Villard is trying to do just what Vanderbilt did. Should Villard also resign the presidency of the Northern Pacific," said the broker, "he will still be worth \$10,000,000, while many of the men who have been clamoring for his retirement from active control of the road he built, will be compelled to begin life anew. The great trouble with Villard is his total indifference to what men about town say or think. He is cold in his nature and loves money. He started out in life to become a millionaire, and he has amassed so much wealth that he is in a position to laugh at and defy his enemies."

The Tribune quotes his secretary as saying that Billings left the board from motives of delicacy, and because of the intimate relations between the company and the Northern Pacific railroad. It is probable that there will arise intricate questions between the two companies, and Villard does not consider it proper that he should vote on both sides of them. "I am sure that his personal interest in both companies is just as large as it ever has been, and his resignation is not at all an intimidation. He has closed out his interest in the stocks of both companies."

The Times says the changes would indicate in some particulars that there were difficulties of which the public had not been advised, and yet the event proved that the time when there seemed to be no bottom was, as usual, the precise time for short speculators to be most wary. The Times says: There has been some sharp criticism of Villard's policy uttered by men whose financial interests have suffered greatly from the decline in Northern Pacific securities. Some of the heaviest stock and bondholders of the road, it is reported, have regarded with growing discontent the demoralization of their securities. Complaint has been made that Villard has shown no disposition or capacity to stay the downward tendency of these stocks and bonds.

The Commercial Market Reporter says: A prominent operator, acquainted with the inside history of the Villard properties, declares that Villard was given unprecedented control of all his financial transactions, and the board of directors were not fully aware of the actual condition of affairs until the depreciation of their property became so wholesale and serious. Villard has managed everything according to his own taste and judgment. It is now no question at all but that he will resign the presidency of the Northern Pacific before three months pass.

CORPORATE INJUSTICE.

The current number of Bradstreet's has an article on the recent combination or agreement between the Pacific railroads, wherein the writer says: "I desire to enter my protest against the pooling arrangement between the overland railroads by which the Northern Pacific company is paid \$500,000 yearly out of earnings of the Central Pacific for leaving the latter in undisputed possession of the California trade. This appears to me to be an immoral, if not an illegal bargain. Both corporations have been liberally endowed by the people, and at the first opportunity, when opposition becomes possible to the advantage of the public, they 'pool their issues,' conspiring to deprive the people—their creator and benefactor—of any benefit that might accrue even from a choice of transportation routes. The Northern Pacific has closed its San Francisco office and left the field to its rival, who can dictate its own terms to the merchants and producers of California, and through them to the Eastern States.

What right have these corporations to conspire to establish the most exacting monopoly in the world? In Prussia they would be brought up with a round turn; but here they are omnipotent. If any one cited them before the district court their judicial tool would rule that interference with railroad corporations is a violation of the fourteenth amendment, or some equally absurd subterfuge for finding in their favor, as was done in the recent California tax suits.

In Prussia, the government controls the railroads; and what is more, it will buy them out compulsorily, fixing its own price. That is the gist of your Berlin correspondent's letter, and it is in accord with current news. It is wrong, therefore, to infer a policy which the conservative forces of the Prussian monarchy declare essential to the well-being and prosperity of the people, cannot be revolutionary and communistic in the United States. We are going dead against the enlightened experience of the world and setting corporations above the state. This is wrong. Let congress act in the premises, and act promptly, or the day of a pacific adjustment may have passed. There are gathering forces in this republic which will redress these glaring abuses without wasting sympathy upon the confederated despoilers of the country, who have become unnumberably insolent in their exactions, and who resort to every subterfuge, not stopping short of perjury, to evade even the payment of taxes to the commonwealth. This is true of "Railroad Kings" in every state. There should be no difficulty in dealing with railroads built wholly or in part by public bounty. The corporations have not kept faith with the people, and the people should resume their own. This will ultimately be the short cut through corporate monopoly.

During the month of September the number of persons who emigrated from German ports and Antwerp, was 14,753, as against 15,536 in the corresponding month, last year. During the first nine months of this year the total number was 133,954, as against 160,966 in the same period of last year.

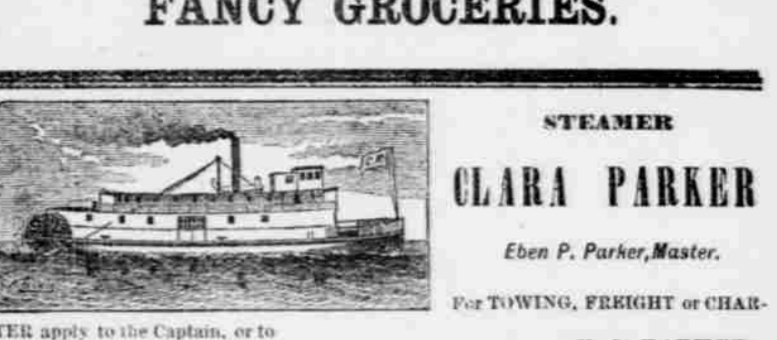
