DECISION ON A NOTE.

In the U. S. circuit court yesterday, says the *Oregonian* of the 24th, Judge Deady rendered a decision on a final hearing in the case of Heywood vs. Harris, a suit brought to enforce the defendant from enforcing the lien of a chattel mortgage. The facts found were these: On November 15, 1883, Roscoe Dixon gave E. D. Curtis & Co., furniture dealers, of Astoria, his promissory note for \$890, payable one day after date with interest, secured with a chattel mortgage on certain personal property. By March 1, 1884, he had paid \$80 on this note. On February 27, 1884, E. D. Curtis & Co. borrowed \$400 of the defendant Harris, for which they gave their note, payable June 18, 1884; and to secure which Curtis & Co. assigned by a separate writing the note and mortgage which they had received of Dixon, and delivered the mortgage but not the note, by order of Harris's attorney, who said it was not necessary. On May 12, 1884, Curtis & Co., being about to fail, indorsed the Dixon note to the plaintiff Heywood as security for a debt of \$886.90 and delivered the same to his attorney, F. R. Strong.

There was a dispute as to whether Strong, when he took this note, knew of the assignment to Harris—Strong swearing that he had not had notice and Curtis swearing that he had told him about it at the time. The court did not decide this dispute, but said that probably Strong did not have notice, because if Curtis had thought it important to tell him of this assignment, he would not have made this unqualified indorsement. The court held (1) that this assignment on a separate piece of paper of the Dixon note to Harris, the same being payable to order, did not convey the legal title, but only the equitable title; (2) that the holder of negotiable paper who takes the same in payment of or as security for a pre-existing debt, is a holder of the same, for value, citing *Swift vs. Tyson*, 16 Pet. 1; *R. Y. Co. vs. National Bank*, 102 U. S. 22, 1st Dan. N. J., sec. 184; (3) that Heywood having taken this note after maturity when it was dishonored for non-payment, took it subject to all the equities existing in favor of any prior parties thereto, including Harris, and that he got nothing more by the indorsement than Curtis, his assignor, then had in the note, which was the balance after the payment of the same due Harris; citing 1st Dan. N. J., sec. 664, 714, 748, 729; 1 Pars. Com., 255; *Foley vs. Smith*, 6 Wal., 493; *Jones Chat. Mort.*, sec. 503.

A PROFITABLE IDEA FOR ASTORIANS.

In the year 1863 codfish were first discovered in the north Pacific, and the product of the first year's fishing was nine tons of fish brought to the San Francisco market. The codfish fleet of last year from San Francisco numbered fourteen vessels, with an aggregate tonnage of 2,754 tons, and the season's catch was 2,053 tons of dried fish. The vast extension of this industry may be taken as an example of what may result from the explorations that have been undertaken by the Canadian government to locate the banks of black cod and other deep sea fish known to exist on the northwest coast of British Columbia. But if the fish of our coast prove to be as plentiful as the indications lead one to expect, we may look for even larger results than have been achieved by the codfishers of San Francisco.

The fisheries frequented by these men are a long way from San Francisco. The nearest banks are off the Choumagin Islands, distant 2,500 miles, and the most remote are in the Ochoak sea, which is 4,000 miles. These fisheries are very extensive, stretching over a distance of 1,500 miles. But their distance, and the perils and hardships incident to the long voyage so far north deter many from entering into the venture. The cod banks of British Columbia are less than 1,000 miles from the terminus of the Central Pacific railroad, and both the cost and risk are infinitely less than the San Francisco men have to contend with. Besides, the black cod has possibly no rival on the coast. It is one of the very best food fishes, and will, therefore, fetch the highest price in the market. The fishermen who operate from San Francisco are able to make only one trip each year, on account of the winters on the Siberian coast; but in the deep sea fisheries of British Columbia there is nothing to hinder two trips a year. The development of our deep sea fisheries is a matter of very great importance to the country. If expectations with respect to their value and extent are realized they will add vastly to the wealth and population and resources of British Columbia.—*British Columbian*.
