This office acknowledges with thanks, the receipt from Washington of a government report on the best means of irrigation of crops. It is a timely and valuable work. The rainfall of this locality during the month of June was seven inches.

A new engine has been put in the West Shore mills, which is increasing the capacity to turn out shooks for the California market. There are now six engines in the establishment; two in the electric light works and four in the mill.

The Northwestern Firemen's association met last Monday at Seattle. It was resolved that a committee of five, two from Oregon and three from Washington, endeavor to secure the passage of a bill by the legislature requiring insurance companies to pay a percentage on policies for the support of fire companies.

The schooner Mollie Adams arrived at Seattle last Monday night from Cape Flattery with 45,000 pounds of halibut. The fish were caught off Cape Flattery in about fifty fathoms of water and were taken in two days. This is considered a most remarkable catch. The fish will be shipped east in refrigerator cars.

The Senate passed the river and harbor bill last Monday. As originally reported from the senate committee on commerce, it appropriates \$21,562,783. As it finally passed the senate it appropriates \$22,474,783, having been increased by the senate \$912,000. All the senate committee amendments, increasing Oregon appropriations, heretofore returned, were adopted. The amount appropriated by the bill for Yaquina bay was \$150,000, month of the Columbia \$500,000, lower Willamette and lower Columbia \$100,000, canal and locks at the Cascades \$300,000. The total amount of the Oregon appropriation is nearly \$1,200,000. The bill also contains a provision for a survey of Dalles rapids. Senator Dolph was appointed on the committee on conference. He anticipates a big fight over the increase for the Oregon appropriations, but hopes by being a member of the committee to hold them in conference.

TO-DAY'S CELEBRATION.

Literary Exercises, Parade, Fireworks, Salutes, Etc.

The uncertainty about the weather has taken some from the general joyousness of the occasion, but Astoria is no worse off as regards wet weather than any other city in the northwest, and we will have a pretty good celebration to-day anyhow.

There will be a salute at sunrise, in charge of Co. "H," one at noon, and another at sunset. The parade will start at 9:30, and will be as follows:

ROUTE OF PARADE. From Chenamus and Cass east to Olney, south to Squemoqua, east to Water, east to West 6th, south to Cedar, east to West 8th, east on Cedar to Ferrer, north on Ferrer to Jefferson, west on Jefferson to Olney, south to Squemoqua, west on Squemoqua to Main, south to Jefferson, east on Jefferson to Genevieve, north on Genevieve to Armory, where literary exercises will take place.

A feature of the parade will be an escort to the liberty car of 65 boys, led by their two captains—Charley Stockton and Bertie Ross, each of whom are just four years old.

The literary exercises will be at Co. "H's" armory, Rev. E. W. Garner, L. L. D. chaplain, Frank Bewley reader, Col. D. F. Copeland, orator.

In the afternoon there will be various races and exercises and in the evening there will be a grand display of fireworks on the knoll at the head of Genevieve street. The fireworks will be unusually fine, six of the set pieces being large, and all well worth seeing.

Of Local Interest. The bill introduced by senator Mitchell providing for the purchase of a site and the construction of a wharf in Astoria for the use of the lighthouse department has been reported back by senator Dolph, from the committee on commerce of the senate, with the recommendation that the appropriation for the same be \$15,000 instead of \$10,000, as originally specified in the bill.

The secretary of the treasury has forwarded to the house of representatives a recommendation of the light house board that there be included in one of the appropriation bills an appropriation of \$60,000 for the establishment of a lighthouse to be provided with fog-signal apparatus and stationed outside of the bar at the mouth of the Columbia river. The board, in their recommendation, reiterated in strong language the arguments that have been used by the government engineers and others relative to this year's improvement.—Washington Corr. Oregonian.

A Marvel of Ingenuity. The new machine built from plans invented by M. Jensen is at the office of the Astoria Iron Works, and is a most ingenious piece of mechanism. Flat pieces of tin, as cut out the requisite size, are laid by the side of the machine and at the rate of one a second are turned out perfectly formed cylinders, with a lock seam. These are passed on over a soldering and wiping machine to a machine that seizes them, puts a bottom on each, solder them and sends them on to a machine that fills them with a pound of salmon, then pushing them over to another machine which puts the top on, solders it and rolls the completed and filled can of salmon out ready to be cooked. The whole thing is done in about the same time that it takes to glance the eye over these lines and is not touched by the hand from the time the flat pieces of tin are laid by the entrance till the cans of salmon are picked up from the tray that swings them to be cooked. The ease, facility, speed, and dexterity of the operation is truly wonderful.
