It Came at Last.

Near the corner of Wall and Pearl street New York thirty-nine years ago, editor David M. Stone of the Journal of Commerce noticed a strong odor of gas from the street. He made a complaint when the odor became unbearable, in December, 1849, again in 1850, once in 1851, once in 1866 and again in 1888, but all these were fruitless. He also made during these years numberless appeals to the police, board of health and other authorities, but they disregarded his requests. For ten years the street has been so permeated with gas that if a cobblestone were lifted out the odor would be noticed for many blocks. But editor Stone has had his revenge in a quiet way. Last Tuesday afternoon the heavy iron covering of an electric conduit manhole near the place of the leak and the stones of the pavement for six or eight feet on three sides of it went up into the air, and the shock of the explosion was felt throughout the neighborhood. No one happened to be passing and no one was killed. The gas had evi-dently leaked into the vacant space and the electric wire had ignited it. The manhole is being repaired, but the gaspipe will be left. An adjoin-ing building may be the scene of the next explosion. Editor Stone the next day published in his editorial columns a long leader on the subject, telling of his many attempts to get the leak repaired since 1849.
