

BLANCO WILL INSPECT.
Starts on a Trip Through the Eastern Part of Cuba.

New York, Jan. 25.—A dispatch from Havana to the World says:

General Blanco's departure for eastern Cuba was not for the purpose of taking the field. His trip seemingly will be one of inspection, though it is said that he will confer with an important mutinous insurgent chief in that part of Cuba.

The governor-general leaves Havana without any misgivings as to the maintaining of order. The inflammatory anti-American circulars gathered about the city were so palpably written by insurgent sympathizers that the volunteers took no notice of them. Yesterday was a favorable time for the display of ultra-Spanish feeling, it being the young king's saint day or name-day, the anniversary of his christening, but there was not a ripple of trouble.

Speaking of the report of an impending attack on Americans, General Lee said:

"I never knew Americans so well thought of since I have been in Havana now. The rumor was probably of the newest brain."
