Who is to invite Mr. Astor to be present in Astoria at the driving of the golden spike, which is likely to occur by the middle of April?

The first steps toward enrolling a naval reserve in Astoria have not been taken as yet, but no more progressive movement could be started. Probably the efforts towards securing the Young's Bay bridge and a city park have overshadowed this other important public matter.

It has been suggested that the Tongue Point syndicate might donate Tongue Point for a city park if the city would make some effort to improve it, even if only "little by little." It is worth trying at least, and while being a natural park site, is good for little else, and its improvement would enhance all surrounding property to a degree that would put it on the market.

The temporary range light question seems to have dropped. It has been stated on semi-official authority that permanent lights cannot yet be established at the mouth of the Columbia, for reasons good to the department, but there is nothing to prevent our having temporary lights, or experiments with the new gas buoys which are being made in other harbors. We need lights at the mouth of the river to indicate the channel and our commercial bodies should see that we get them.

Prosperity in Oregon is coming—it is right here. People from the east are arriving in Portland at the rate of 5 to 150 every day and not all are Klondikers by any means. New industries are being established, and farmers are being located. Only the other day, through the efforts of the O. R. & N. Company, a large fruit and vegetable canning establishment in eastern Oregon was started, and Industrial Agent Johnson is reported to have said that the outlook for other industries is most promising. Clatsop county must get into the swim. We have many latent resources that only need developing. With help of this kind a good start can be made. Mr. Judson will be at liberty about April 1, and it is understood that he will be glad to meet Astorians at the Chamber of Commerce, or Progressive Association and discuss means and methods of aiding his culture, lumber manufacture, or other internal commercial enterprises that will increase population, disburse money and raise values on the basis of enlarged commerce. He is one of the men Astoria is looking for.

The time has arrived when there should be established by the Chamber of Commerce, or other commercial body, a bureau of statistics which will keep a careful record of the tonnage and kind of freight shipped to and from this port, by rail and sea; its reports to be published periodically in order that the public may be kept informed of the business done here and be in a position to make important comparisons of the advance or the retrogression of affairs. By such reports trade balances can be regulated and faults adjusted in any particular line; defects remedied, an impetus given here, or too rank or wrongly directed growth there trimmed into proper channels. Every merchant in the city should be able to correctly state each year and each month the value of the salmon on the Columbia river and tributary to Astoria, the value of the salmon shipped away fresh, the value of the lumber sent abroad, the value of butter and cheese exported, the value of leather and hide shipped, paper pulp, hops, disbursements of custom house, disbursements of the lighthouse tenders and life saving crews, disbursements of the lighthouse department for bays, buoy depot keeper, repairs on tenders, state light keepers, military

disbursements at the fort, jetty and engineer disbursements, receipts of bar pilots, receipts of river pilots, disbursements of bar tugs, etc., etc. All these sources of revenue are from the outside and represent receipts in trade like so much gold dug out of the ground—money added to Clatsop's circulating medium. How much of it is retained? It is one of the functions of a body like the Chamber of Commerce to show all these figures in intelligent form, and to prepare permanent records of them from year to year. Portland, Seattle, Spokane, Chicago, New York, San Francisco and every other live and progressive city keep these records through some commercial organization. Why should not Astoria?

A SCHEME AGAINST ANNEXATION.

It would be interesting to know just what influence is behind the opposition to Hawaiian annexation. Some days ago an eastern dispatch announced that the most powerful and determined lobby seen in Washington for years was engaged in the fight against the pending treaty. But it seems that the anti-annexationists are not confining their fight to the halls of congress. Trouble has broken out between the sugar beet growers of the country and the best sugar manufacturers, as there is every reason to believe to the campaign now going on against the admission of Hawaii. It seems that the sugar manufacturers want to insert a clause in contracts made with farmers for next season's supply of beets providing that if Hawaiian annexation goes into effect, producers of beets shall be paid only \$2.30 per ton; otherwise, the price paid last year, \$4 per ton, shall be paid. Farmers generally have refused to sign these contracts, and the Beet Raisers' Association of Nebraska has declared officially that no sugar beets will be raised in that state this year, while the manufacturers have announced that if these contracts are not accepted, no factories will be operated in the state.

This is a scheme worthy of the "cyle of fighting adopted by the Bryan fake bureau during the last campaign. There is no reason to reduce the price of beets to anything contained in the Hawaiian treaty, but the opposition is that farmers are not well enough informed to know this. The annexation of Hawaii cannot affect the price of sugar beets in the least, as compared with last year's conditions. The sugar from Hawaii comes in free now, under the reciprocity treaty, and no more of it will come in after annexation than at present. If sugar makers could afford to pay \$4 per ton for beets last year, or under existing conditions, they can afford to pay the same price after the ratification of the treaty. Their purpose apparently is to reduce the price of beets to the farmers, under threat of the evils to arise from Hawaiian annexation, and thus arouse a feeling among the agricultural classes unfavorable to annexation on the entirely false ground that annexation will tend to discourage the newly established industry of sugar beet growing. It is gratifying to know that the farmers, as represented by the Beet Raisers' Association, decline to be foisted this way.
