FARMERS SIDE WITH EMPLOYERS

When it comes to promoting social-
istic schemes for the "proletariat"
the farmer jumps onto the side of
the capitalist and employers.

In the great national conference
of labor and capital, the farm dele-
gates are causing a heap of trouble
by not being willing to swallow the
socialistic program. The farmer
contingent, long counted on as natu-
rally allied with labor, seems inclined
to side with the employers.

There are only three representa-
tives of the farmers in the confer-
ence and they are a thorn in the side
of everybody, including the national
administration.

"How do you farmers stand on the
eight-hour day?" some one asked
Charles S. Barrett of Georgia, mem-
ber of the farmer group.

"Why, we're the people who in-
vented it," answered Mr. Barrett. We
have it already—eight hours before
noon and eight hours after noon."

The farmers are officially identi-
fied with the employers' group, but
they are making life uncomfortable
for all groups by constant insist-
ence that the farmer has been ig-
nored by the government and
trampled on by organized labor.


