NEED OF CENTRAL PARK.
Park sites adjacent to the business center of Enterprise are limited to one or two, and they will be gone before another summer at the present rate of the town's growth.
Events of the last two months show the extreme need of an open space for public purposes near the business district. A place for celebrations is essential to the financial success of such gatherings, if not absolutely necessary to holding them at all.
A central park would also give a place for all other outdoor gatherings, besides serving as a place of rest and recreation.
Of the one or two sites remaining, it is stated one at least can now be secured on fairly reasonable terms. This is the chance for someone to start a move that would be of inestimable benefit not only to the present generation but for all time to come.

PAYING FOR NOISE.
The returns of Fourth of July casualties so far gathered and published by the Chicago Record-Herald, covering the entire United States, show that as usual the deaths from wounds caused by the paper cap pistols to be far in the lead. It is the deadliest of all means employed to "celebrate" the glorious anniversary, and the worst feature is the victims are all innocent children who suffer terrible deaths from lockjaw. The paper cap pistols and canes should be rigidly barred from sale, and now is the time for the council to pass the ordinance, long before dealers place their orders for next year.
Dynamite crackers should also be prohibited, though they are not so deadly as the paper cap pistols and canes, and probably a majority of their victims are grown men or large boys. Most persons would say that any grown man or large boy who tosses a hand or arm fooling with a dynamite cracker, deserves his fate. The foolkiller is way behind on his job and needs some help. But for the sake of children, prohibit the dynamite cracker as well as the pistols and canes.
