Wealth in Oregon streams, as well  
as in the fertile soil of the Beaver  
state, is shown by the figures of  
the annual take of salmon in Ore-  
gon waters, chiefly the Columbia riv-  
er. A total of 290,000 cases, 35,

000,000 pounds, was packed during  
the past year, having a value of \$3,-  
500,000.

That Oregon will have a popula-  
tion of 1,200,000 when the next cen-  
sus rolls around is the prediction of  
R. B. Miller, traffic manager of the  
Harriman lines in the Northwest. He  
bases his figures on the constant  
western trend of populations as dis-  
closed by former census statistics.  
He estimates that the United States  
will have a population of 113,000,000.  
This additional population, he be-  
lieves, will pour westward to find an  
outlet in the vacant agricultural  
lands of the Coast states. Nowhere  
is there a greater area of unclaimed  
land than in Oregon and the migra-  
tion will cover this area as it seeks  
new territory to occupy.
