

HOO-HOO LARGELY IT

The Great Black Cat Members Much in Evidence.

KITTENS DO LIVELY SCRATCHING

Many Visiting Hoo-Hoo Participants in Exercises and Enjoy Fine Banquet.

The Concatenated Order of Hoo-Hoo, an organization wholly devoid of jumbled or mythical or scrambled ancient history, held a concatenation in Cottage Grove on Saturday night last, when nineteen frolicsome kittens were initiated into the mysteries of Hoo-Hoo after which a "Session on the Roof" was held. The gathering was under the immediate direction of Snark Frank H. Rosenberg of this city, who presides over the Southern Oregon jurisdiction, and to his enthusiasm in the work and the perfectness of the preliminary arrangements is due, most largely, the unqualified success of the affair. It was the first assembling in fraternal union of men engaged in so great an industry ever held in this section of the state. It was a gathering of forces whose unity of purpose made for prosperity and growth; a meeting of good fellowship in closer acquaintance and a opening into lasting friendship. The trials and tribulations of business were left at home by the visiting delegations, and cats and kittens alike entered upon the occasion unnumbered.

'Twas the betwixting hour of midnight when the Hoo-Hoo walked forth to the banquet hall, where a bountiful luncheon had been provided by Snark Rosenberg and his then only other co-worker in Cottage Grove, J. S. Hill. As is customary on these occasions, an experience meeting was held, presided over by Mr. Kelly, of the Booth-Kelly company, in a very commendable manner. Mr. Kelly possesses a peculiar faculty for obtaining "confessions," and several subjects involuntarily pleaded guilty to charges openly proffered.

Snark Rosenberg was tendered a vote of thanks for the elaborateness of the preparations, the splendid feast, and the success of the concatenation as a whole.

THE HOO-HOO.

The organization of Hoo-Hoo is strictly a trade organization, and limits its membership to those engaged in the lumber traffic, or those directly interested in the business. All lumbermen are not Hoo-Hoo, but all Hoo-Hoo, practically speaking, are lumbermen. One general meeting is held each year, on the ninth day of the ninth month, and the initiation fee for membership is \$9.99. The membership is limited to 99,999, and from this it will be seen that there is still room for a few more. Hoo-Hoo is the only order in existence where each individual becomes a member of the national organization. There are no state or local lodges, hence representatives to the national body are those who attend, no matter from what section of this globular world they may hail. "Concatenations" for the initiation of candidates for membership are held at frequent intervals in important lumbering centers like Cottage Grove. The Hoo-Hoo has numerous advantages, socially and from a business standpoint; the meetings are interesting and profitable, and it is a significant fact that no member has ever signified a willingness to let go. The pleasant acquaintances and business influences cause the Hoo-Hoo to stick like a porous plaster.

All the officers are elected each year at the annual meeting. The Snark of the Universe is the highest office in Hoo-Hoo and can be held by the same man only one year. To

way connected with the business to which you give your toil by day and your thoughts by night; he is one of the twenty thousand men who are traveling your road to the goal that rewards success in the vocations named. His acquaintance is sure to be pleasant, and it may be profitable. At least in the initiation of Hoo-Hoo, you are on common ground, and acquaintance begins easy and ripens fast.

No local lodge with obligatory attendance and heavy expenses, are maintained. Wherever two or three members are gathered together, for either work or pleasure, there is a lodge in session.

HISTORY OF HOO-HOO.

The origin of Hoo-Hoo was accidental—some say providential. Some passenger cars were derailed between Camden and Gurden, Arkansas, one morning in 1892, and delayed a number of lumbermen who were returning to their homes from a meeting of the Arkansas Yellow Pine Manufacturers' Association. During the delay caused by the accident on the sunny side of a lumber pile, the order was conceived by Bolling A. Johnson. The idea was to band together as brothers those who were in kindred lines of business, and yet not actually engaged in the lumber industry. It was at first proposed that the Order be called "The Ancient Order of Camp Followers," but later on a broader view prevailed and in the end the organization became a lumbermen's order, the membership being extended to include all those people engaged in any line of industry which brings them in close business contact with lumbermen.

In the parlor of the Hotel Hall, at Gurden, the salient points of Hoo-Hoo were settled, and a name for the Order was selected. No one knows just why Hoo-Hoo was hit upon, but the word concatenated is peculiarly appropriate since it carries suggestion of being "linked together as by tails."

In the beginning it was decided that the Order should be founded upon the traditions of ancient Egypt, that the emblem of the Order should be a black cat and that there should be no lodge rooms and no enforced nights of attendance. It was suggested that the names of the officers should be taken from Lewis Carroll's nonsense poem "The Hunting of the Snark," but, except for these slight particulars, nothing very definite was laid down at that time, and not one of those present had any idea that the Order then founded would ever have more than possibly one hundred members. The fact that it grew and that it continues to grow is evidence that the Order stands for something bigger than was imagined by those present at its founding—that they built better than they knew, and that behind what is tangible and apparent in the Order stands a real and vital principle, which is the cause of Hoo-Hoo's existence and prosperity.

This Order is often spoken of as a lumber organization on account of the fact that more lumbermen have availed themselves of the opportunity to become members of the Order than any other class who are eligible to membership. The word Hoo-Hoo and the word lumbermen have, by

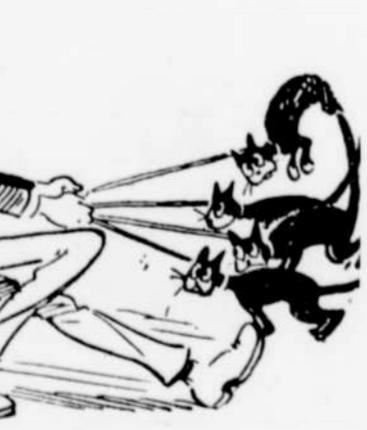

OBJECTS OF HOO-HOO.

It is not The Sentinel's aim to treat this subject in its entirety, but only insofar as it may be explained to the uninitiated. The one comprehensive aim of the Order is to promote the health, happiness and long life of its members. It proposes to do this mainly by gathering together in a social and fraternal brotherhood the men, and only those men, between whom there already exists the greatest of bonds—that of a common business interest. No other order proceeds on a similar line. One Mason may see another Mason, and he will know he is a good man and worthy citizen, but one may be a doctor and the other a lawyer, and the great incentive to acquaintance and fellowship is lacking. Not so with the Hoo-Hoo. The brother with the badge on is not only a good man and a worthy citizen; he is in some
