If there is a picturesque railroad route in Oregon it is surely along the route of the O. S. E. Ry. from this city to Bohemia. Grand scenery cannot be found than that along this route and in the Bohemia Mining District, and better trout streams and hunting grounds are certainly hard to find. In fact Cottage Grove is splendidly adapted to the wants of the health and pleasure seeker. Row river and Bohemia offers magnificent hunting and fishing grounds. Eighteen miles south on the line of the Southern Pacific is located the famous Boswell Springs, while on Coast Fork, twelve miles from Cottage Grove, near Amos is found the well known Oregon Mineral Springs, owned by Levi Geer, who is this season fitting the property with an excellent hotel, bath houses and camping grounds. These springs are highly recommended for kidney and liver troubles and all blood diseases, and plenty of sport can be found with rod and gun.

W. F. Morphy, of the O. S. E. Ry. Co., this week had a large number of bills struck off at this office advertising the fact that he wishes to employ row men and teams to haul ore from the mines out from this city and being constructed as fast as possible. The wages offered are good, and still it will be difficult for him to secure that number of teams, for the reason that every one is busy and now in possession of lucrative employment. Five years ago it was different. People were crying hard times and talking free silver, with no work. Had a man advertised for row teams then you would have been in evidence, and no questions asked as to the amount paid. Anything at that time that would bring in enough to quiet the pangs of hunger of man and beast was good enough. Recall those times and then look about you now. Even those who were sincere in their populist views, are now convinced of their error and are hard at work.

A private letter received from Mel O. Warner, the promoter of the smelter which is to be built between here and the Bohemia Mining District, imparts the information that he is meeting with fine success and that everything will be ready for construction work in the very near future. One of the principal parties interested in the project has been unavoidably detained elsewhere on a like business enterprise, hence much of the delay is accounted for in that way. Surely Mr. Warner has the best wishes of all who are sufficiently identified with the mining interests of Bohemia to fully realize the necessity of the move, and when the time comes he will undoubtedly get the volunteer support of the people of this section.

And now comes "Cheap John" opera house plays in which Tracy and Merrill figure conspicuously, calculated to draw large crowds especially of young lads to whom the career of these dare-devil outlaws has been a brilliant campaign from start to finish. These shows have been refused admittance by the managers of opera houses in several of our neighboring towns as they should be everywhere, for nothing would prove more demoralizing to the "callow youth" than a play lionizing these desperadoes.

During September and October, cheap rates and advertising matter will bring more home-seekers to this locality than has ever yet visited the section, if we may judge from the concentrated effort that is being put forth by the Harriman lines. These, too, will be from the Mississippi valley states and a very desirable class of people hence no effort should be spared to induce a fair share to locate here.

A heading in the Grants Pass Observer of last week must have attracted some attention among its readers. "Dam Workmen Strike" is the way they put it but upon perusing the article it does not appear so strong. 'Twas only men employed on a dam across Rogue river, that has struck.

It is a foregone conclusion that Cottage Grove needs more houses to rent. There are men walking the streets at the present time trying to find a place to rent suitable to install their families.

There is no use denying it. Cottage Grove does need, and badly too, a sewerage system, and some action should be taken at the earliest possible moment regarding it.

Thursday, Friday and Saturday this week, the editors of Oregon meet at Newport, compare notes, exchange consolation and bathe in the briny deep.

Homesteading Timber Land.

In the Oregon City district John J. Galvin filed on a homestead claim in September, 1900, and lived on and cultivated it. He tried several times to sell his relinquishment and in March, 1901, sold it, but not until after W. L. Buckner had filed a contest on the grounds that Galvin took the land for speculation and did not intend to make it his home and that it was more valuable for its timber than for agriculture. The Oregon City register and receiver dismissed the contest, but Buckner appealed to the general land office and won. Commissioner Herman said in his decision: "It is found notwithstanding Galvin complied with the law as to residence and cultivation, that his intention and purpose at the time he made entry was to live on his land 14 months and commute his entry. It must therefore, be held that his entry was speculative, and that the contestant has established the truth of the charge." To comply with the law a homestead must not be taken with the intention of commuting or selling it and some of the filers of contested cases now in the land office will learn this fact if the contestants carry them to the general land office. Some district land officers tell people: "Oh, you needn't do more than go to a homestead and stay over night once in a while and do a little slashing."

Many a man believes this and acts accordingly. If a contestant appears and carries the case to Washington and gets justice the filer loses his time, his money and his homestead right. But what does the local official care for that? He gets fees for the first filing, fees in the contest case and fees when the successful contestant files. He does not know how long he may remain in office, and he makes hay while the sun shines.—Ex.

Death of John Settle.

The following letter from W. D. McNary, M. D., assistant physician at the State Insane Asylum to Mrs. John Settle will be self explanatory: Salem, Ore., Aug. 6, 1902. Mrs. Maggie Settle, Eugene, Ore. Dear Madam: I am instructed by Dr. Calbraith to write to you with regard to the sudden and unexpected death of your husband, of which we telegraphed you this morning. Mr. Settle had been getting along nicely, having improved very much mentally, and, in fact, last evening appeared to be almost perfectly rational, though he complained of feeling weak physically. He, however, stated that he was feeling better in that regard, as he had been sick for sometime. This morning at 5:30, when he was called by his attendant he got up and dressed, and appeared to be as well as he had been on retiring the evening before. He started to go to the bath room to wash, where he sank down upon the floor and died almost immediately. The cause of his death was evidently a weak heart, which had given under the strain of his recent trouble. We have telegraphed his brother at Lorain.
