A great deal of interest is being manifested in the Oregon State Good Roads convention to be held at the rooms of the Portland Commercial Club November 14th-15th. Hon. John H. Scott, of Salem, president of the State Association, urges the appointment of delegates and asks for a large attendance. There will be present a number of able speakers who have given years of practical road-building. The county judges and county commissioners of Oregon are especially responsible for the success of this meeting and are urged to send delegates. The same is true with regard to commercial, industrial, agricultural and horticultural societies, reporting a list of same at once to President Scott, at Salem.

The dinner in honor of Mr. M. J. Roche, recently elected President of the American Association of Travelling Passenger Agents, at the Portland Commercial Club Saturday night, was attended by the officials of over twenty of the leading American railroads, the officials of the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition and the Governors of Oregon and Washington. Mr. Roche has attended for years, the national conventions of this association and has used every possible effort to advertise the resources of Oregon in every portion of the United States. The passenger officials of the United States had much to do with the success of the Lewis and Clark Exposition and they will also be instrumental in making a success of the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition.

**THE ELECTIONS**

Latest Returns this Morning Indicate Big Republican Majorities.

Elections held throughout the country yesterday passed off in comparatively quiet. Returns from various sections show the following results: Massachusetts re-elects the entire republican ticket headed by Governor Guild.

Pennsylvania elects J. O. Sheate, republican, head of the ticket, for state treasurer.

New York city elects Tammany candidates by considerable majorities over Independence league and republican fusion candidates.

San Francisco, Nov. 7.—(Wednesday)—At one o'clock this morning a totaling of partial returns indicates the election of almost the entire good government city and county ticket, including mayor, district attorney, board of supervisors, city attorney, sheriff, coroner and police judges. The union labor party, save auditor and county clerk on a basis of ten per cent of 27th precincts—with Mission district largely to be heard from. Mayor Taylor's plurality over union labor candidate, P. McCarthy should approximate 900; District Attorney Langdon's plurality over McGowan union labor nominee, is 18,000.

Louisville, Ky., Nov. 5.—Complete reversal of the usual democratic majorities in Louisville and heavy republican gains throughout the state.

Boston, Nov. 5.—The republicans won a sweeping victory in today's election by re electing Governor Guild and all other state officers.

Cincinnati, Nov. 5.—By a decisive plurality a possibly a close majority over all four competitors, Colonel Leopold Markleit, was today elected mayor of Cincinnati on the republican ticket.

Providence, Nov. 5.—Indications are that Governor James H. Higgins, democrat, has been re elected by a slight gain over his vote at the last election.

Cleveland, Nov. 5.—SIMY precincts out of 243 give Burton, 13,000; Johnson, 11,000.

Cleveland, Nov. 5.—At republican headquarters Secretary Redway queried the election of Mayor Johnson.

**Regarding Homestead Entries.**

Department of the Interior, General Land Office, Washington D. C., October 21, 1907. Registers and Receivers, United States Land Offices.

Sir: You are directed to at once inform all newspapers in your respective districts, as a matter of news, that in all cases where homestead entries are made after Nov. 1, 1907, commutation grants must show actual and continuous bona fide residence for the full period of fourteen months.

In all cases where the entries were made before Nov. 1, 1907, the rule heretofore existing that six months constructive residence following the date of the entry will be considered as a part of the required fourteen months residence, will remain in force. Very respectfully,
