Parker Fifty Years Ago.

Special from Parker.
Very near the present site of Parker
fifty years ago, there was a post office
named Bloomington; Harrison Linville,
the post master, came with his family
to this place in April, 1847. There was
also a stage station and ferry boat on
the Luckiamute, the stage line from
Salem to Corvallis was under the gen-
eral management of the late ex-senator H.
W. Corbet. The mid-day meal was
taken here.

There was a barn built by Linville in
1833. The large square timbers for the
frame work were 10 x 10 inches and
were hewn in 1852. There were relig-
ious meetings held in the grove once in
every month when the weather was fair,
and at the house when the weather was
unfavorable. On one occasion in the
month of June, a very large congregation

had assembled and a rain storm threat-
ened to dampen the enthusiasm of the
crowd as well as their clothing, so they
went to the newly finished barn and had
a most enjoyable service.

Among the ministers in those days
were: Rev. W. H. Waller, McBride,
Alex. McCarty, John Rigden, Glenn
Burnett and Powell.

The barn which did such valuable
service for nearly fifty years was leveled
to the ground some weeks ago and some
of the timbers used in building a root
house, which Mr. Fuqua, the present
owner of the place, has filled with beets
and potatoes for feeding stock.
