fifty years ago, there was a post office and potatoes for feeding stock. named Biopmington; Harrison Linville, at the home of her son in Cali- the post master, came with his family to this place in April, 1847. There was also a stage station and ferry boat on the Luckiamute, the stage line from Salem to Corvallis was under the general management of the late ex-senator H. W. Corbet, The mid-day meal was taken here.

There was a barn built by Linville in 1853. The large square timbers for the frame work were 10 x 10 inches and were hewn in 1852. There were religious meetings held in the grove once in and at the house when the weather was unfavorable. On one occasion in the month of June, a very large congregation situated on North side of C Street. every month when the weather was fair,

had assembled and a rain storm threatened to dampen the enthusmsm of the It is exceptional to to find a family crowd as well as their clothing, so they went to the newly finished barn and had a most enjoyable service.
