MCCORMICK WILL CONTEST.

Complaint Filed Alleges Irregularities in Election.

E. L. McCormick will contest the vote for county clerk in last week's election in which the official returns gave J. W. Shute a plurality of 4 votes.

The notice of contest filed in the circuit court yesterday alleges many irregularities, and charges that ballots counted for Bailey were irregular in that they had the names of voters written on them and bore other distinguishing marks.

The complaint charges that through errors and irregularities votes cast for McCormick were counted for Bailey, and complainant alleges he received a majority of all legal votes cast. He asks a recount and that the certificate of election be given him.

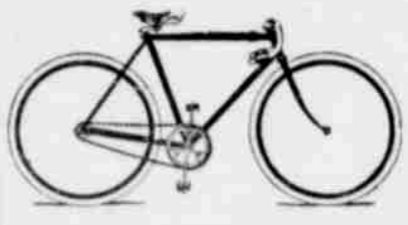
