Troops were ordered to kill prison-ers and to finish the wounded. The Helpless women and children and decrepit old men were slaughtered."

Winston Churchill. Recently Resigned as First Lord of the Admirality, Tells the Commons of the Campaign

London, Nov. 15 .- Baring the iner secrets of his erstwhile office of first lord of the admiralty, Winston Churchill informed the house of commons today that the Dardanelles ex-pedition was a "gamble." Yet, it was a gamble taken after mature refection, he indicated.

"I regarded the Dardanelles enterprise," he explained, "as a legitimate gamble of war for a prize of inestimable value, with a reasonable chance of winning. On that basis, I went before the ministry and accepted full esponsibility for initiating it."

Denying that the fleet was sent to the Dardanelles over Admiral Lord Flaher's objections, Churchill said that the sea lord assented to every movement.

"However, Fisher did not give clear guidance and the firm support I might have expected," said Churchill, confirming stories of friction be tween them. "If he did not approve, he should have spoken out."
