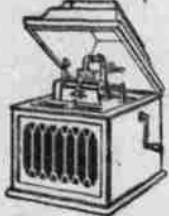

**SAYS OREGON SHOULD
BOOST FOR REDWOODS**

There are three beauty spots around Oregon that ought to achieve international fame, according to Rollin Laird, district attorney for Del Norte county, Cal., who is a visitor from Crescent City at the Imperial. Mr. Laird is endeavoring to interest

commercial organizations in protecting the northern California redwoods and is spreading far and wide the gospel of the newly-organized "save the redwood" league. He knows a bit about timber himself, having in the early days, walked from the straits of Juan de Fuca to Aberdeen studying the forests of Washington. Mr. Laird's conclusion is that the redwoods are far more valuable from a scenic standpoint than for commercial uses and that they rank with the Columbia highway and Josephine County Caves as attractions for tourist travel. Within a short time \$400,000 is to be spent on the stretch of roads through the redwoods between Grants Pass and Crescent City so as to make them better for travel. "Oregon as a whole should boost for this," he declared, "for its own interests are closely allied with the project."—Oregonian.
